EW YORK, Oct. 12.—Cast permanently, it would seem, in heroic mold, Casey Stengel—"Casey the immortal"—smashed the New York Glants to victory with a home-run drive this afternoon for the second time in three days of record-breaking world's series strife with the Yankees,

Lashed into the right field bleachers of the Yankee Stadium in the seventh inning, Stengel's blow broke up a tense, thrilling hurling duel between Art Nehf, southpaw star of the Giants, and "Sad Sam" Jones of the Yanks, and gave the world's champions their solitary, but sufficient, margin in a brilliant 1 to 0 triumph.

The greatest throng that ever paid its way into a baseball arena—65,000 frenzied fans, who were massed in the gigantic inclosure—while 30,000 more swirled about the entrances outside, saw Stengel deliver the blow that gave John McGraw and his wayriors a two to one game in the most stirring baseball draws of all time.

All world's series ecords for attendance and gate receipts were shattered by that vast gathering in baseball's greatest amphitheatre. The actual paid attendance was 62,436, besides 30,000 more who did not go through the turnstiles, while the total receipts were \$201,072, putting the three-game figures beyond \$500,000.

The paid attendance broke the former record of 60,331 established during a double-header at the Stadium late in the regular season, while the gathering as a whole has but one superior in size, that of approximately 70,000 that witnessed the dedication of the big structure last spring.

For a day Stengel had stepped out of the limelight while Babe Ruth rose to the pinnacle of fame with two circuit clouts that swept the Yankees to victory in the second game of the third successive title struggle between these Gotham rivals. But today, "Old Casey," bow-legged but lion-hearted, knew again the call to glory that was his when his ninth-inning home run gave the Giants their first triumphand and gain he answered its summons.

His work was but slightly less effective than that of Jones. Three times he faced serious threats by the Yankees, and on each occasion he rose to the emergency and turned back his foe, In only one inning, the fifth, did the Yankees gather more than one hit off Nehf. He issued three passes, two of them purposely to beat Ruth, and each time the strategy, annopular though it was to the crowd that wanted to see the Babe "bust tem," was vindicated.
