KNOTTY PROBLEMS FACE SOUTHERN ONTARIO LOOP

Meeting Here Friday Will Consider Revamped Senior Circuit.

SUGGEST TWO SERIES

Sarnia and Stratford May Be Stepped Up a Notch.

The Southern Ontario Amateur Baseball League will meet Friday night at the local Chamber of Commerce with some knotty problems to tackle.

First there is the question of a revamped senior division with Woodstock and Stratford having already expressed the intention of dropping into intermediate ranks, and this will probably bring up the question of the South League running an intermediate series as well as senior.

Sarnia and Stratford delegates have been invited—both as senior prospects. It is doubtful, however, if the latter will consider senior. Sarnia is viewed favorably by both St. Thomas and London officials. Despite the long jump, it is realized that real senior baseball would be a big attraction in the border city.

Stratford and Woodstock both desire to play intermediate, and St. Thomas also will support an intermediate team. St. Thomas, however, wants a grouping with southern towns like Ridgeway, Aylmer, so that may mean that if the Southern League decided to run an intermediate section, it would be in two groups, London, Woodstock, Stratford, with Stratford and Lucan as possibilities, would make a northern group; St. Thomas and the other towns a southern circuit.

The Inter-County League runs both senior and intermediate divisions, although the clubs in all the other towns affected run their own affairs, and are not combined. It is likely that the St. Thomas intermediates will be sponsored by the seniors, though.

At a banquet held here last night P. J. Mulqueen, Toronto, chairman of the Canadian Olympic committee, told the hockey team that the under-secretary of state for physical education, who presided and General Kenish of the British Olympic committee, sat on M. Vidal's left. This was taken as a slight on the French desire to co-operate with the British Empire, and the speeches bore out this friendly sentiment.

Gans Gamely Agreed To Arbitrary Conditions Laid Down.

CHAPTER XI. The Greatest Fight Ever Staged. BY T. E. RICKARD.

When Billy Nolan came into Goldfield with Bittling Nelson for training I had my first taste of what a promoter has to contend with in the matter of managers.

I don't want to give the impression that all fight managers are bad. Many of them are mere parasites, living off their fighters and causing all sorts of irritating troubles just to impress the fighter with what they consider their efficiency. There are many others, though, who are not only helpful to their fighters but do much toward keeping the fight game on a high basis. The success of several fighters has been due more to the wisdom and judgment of the manager than of the fighter himself.

Bill Nolan was of the irritating, annoying brand. To begin with he insisted that all of the \$30,000 purse was to go to Nelson. That would have left Joe Gans without anything. That, however, made no difference to Nolan.

"When I wired you that we would come for a purse of \$30,000," he said, "I meant that would be Nelson's price."

I was quite certain that Nolan hadn't understood anything of the kind. Besides I had the agreement in writing.

Immediately I discovered that fighting was not exactly on a sportsmanlike basis when it came to money.

We wrangled and wrangled over this matter until the whole camp was disgusted. The referee, however, said all kinds of roasts to Nolan. He deserved them, too. The town people were strongly aligned against him for his selfishness.

Poor Joe Gans and his manager, McDonald, seemed to be up against it every way they turned. Joe was a smart darkey and a very honorable one. I made up my mind to see that he got a square deal. There would be no run-out by Nolan. It got through his head pretty soon that the mining town with the light or make it unhealthy for him.

Tex Agrees to Increase Purse.

By this time I could see that the fight was going to be a financial success. It was in the air. The promoters had had plenty of money to spend and were getting more and more enthusiastic every day. The actual building of the arena smoked things up a little more. We could have come out clean on the fight, but without the big crowd of visitors. But we wanted the visitors to advertise our town, that being the prime motive in starting the affair.

Finally I agreed to raise the purse to \$33,500. Of this Nolan was to get \$22,500 for Nelson and Gans was to get \$11,000. Anything I did seemed to satisfy Gans. Nelson, however, was the writing on the wall and also agreed.

With this trouble off my hands I ran right into another one. I added to the former irritation by notifying us that Gans would have to weigh in 133 pounds at the ringside. This was much taller than the 125 pounds Gans had weighed under any conditions, finally agreed to make it.

Anybody would think everything all right after that. But no. "Rickard," Nolan told me the next time I went out to his camp, "Gans has got to weigh in 133 pounds at the ringside with his fighting togs on."

That straw almost broke the camel's back. It was plain that Nolan was doing everything possible to stir things up. He was trying to make an impression on Nelson.

I was not a boxing man. I was a boxing man, and naturally, did not understand these things. I went to Gans, though, and told him of Nolan's demand.

"Boss," said the darkey, "Nolan hasn't got any right to do that, and he knows it."

Gans Says "I'll Try."

"Can you make that weight in your fighting togs, Joe?" "I'll try, Mr. Rickard, but I don't believe I can do it. That weight will weaken me."

Just the same Nolan insisted. Gans, again willing to concede anything, set about to reduce his weight. He made it, but to this day I think it weakened him in that long fight. I was the happiest man in the world when he finally got those two lightweight men in the ring and saw George Siler present as referee.

Nolan's tactics had turned many people against him and Gans had a big following. He was always a popular fighter.

Long before the bell sounded for the first round I knew that our Goldfield fight had made good with a bang. We had priced the tickets at from \$5 to \$25 and the big demand was for the higher ones.

To my mind that was the greatest fight I ever staged. Those men fought 42 rounds, neither willing to give up.

And Goldfield Celebrated.

In the end Nelson fouled Gans with a blow in the groin. That blow and the discussion aroused by it will take up in my attempt at describing that fight, as I saw it, in my next chapter.

The total receipts of that fight were \$69,715. Of this \$33,500 went to the fighters and \$23,000 for expenses. My net profit was \$13,215.

Not one of those who guaranteed the purse had to put up a nickel. We had pulled off a successful fight in Goldfield, and, gee, how that town celebrated.

The day of the big purse had dawned. If Goldfield could put up \$33,500 what could the big cities do in the fight itself was a hummer.

BOXING IN NEW YORK NEEDS GUIDING HAND

Fight Game May Pass Out Unless a "Landis" Comes Forth.

New York, Jan. 28.—Boxing is shaking at its foundations in New York State and unless there is a move to guide its destinies in the emergency, it may not survive present attacks. This was the gist of a declaration made last night by State Senator James J. Walker before the annual dinner of the Baseball Writers' Association.

The statement by Senator Walker, father of the present boxing law here and promoter of a majority leader in the Upper House of the legislature, was the first admission from an official source that the fist game here is in a precarious condition. Reports have been current for some time of anti-boxing agitation, due to alleged gambling, unpopular decisions and other causes of dissatisfaction, but until last night they had not been given official cognizance.
