### GERMAN RAILROADS TO PAY INTEREST ON ALLIED DEBTS

Experts Believe Solution To European Reparation Problem Has Been Found.

AVOID BIG LOAN

and France Would Hold 52 Per Cent of Proposed Mortgage Bonds of Roads.

> Associated Press Despatch. Berlin, Feb. 19.-The expert committees are making excellent progress toward a tangible conclusion as to how to put Germany in the way to pay her reparations. The sub-committees on the budget and cur-

placed on the international mark previously suggested, a mortgage of approximately 10,000,000,000 gold approximately 10,000,000,000 gold marks on the German railway system and other sources of revenue of the German government shall form the basis of a plan by which the allied countries, especially France, will derive regular payments of interest.

The mortgage bonds to be issued would be a first lien on the railways

and be divided among Germany's creditors on the basis of the percentage adopted at the Spa confer-ence in 1920—France 52 per cent; Great Britain 26; Italy 10; Belgium;—with the remaining four per cent livided among the other allies.

A relatively small international oan will also be recommended to help Germany set up the proposed national gold issue bank. The amount of this loan remains to be fixed, but it will probably not exceed \$500,000,000

### KING GEORGE ASKS **RELIGIOUS U**

Deplores Unemployment Conditions in England in Reply to Canterbury Address.

Associated Press Despatch. London, Feb. 19 .- Replying to adresses presented by the convocation of Canterbury and York today, King George said he was gratified that the convocations has placed fore-most among their tasks the vital question of Christian unity.

"It always has been my fervent ope," he said, "that a greater measure of unity might be promoted amongst the different religious communions and I trust your deliberacloser fellowship among Christian

The King deplored the prevailing unemployment and the scarcity of housing and thanked the convocaons for their active co-operation in neasures leading to the improvement these conditions.

Regarding the League of Nations and the peace of the world the King said he joined in praying God to give blessing to the men of goodwill "who are earnestly striving to secure the peace of the world. To that end and I heartily agree with you as to the importance of maintaining be-tween ourselves and our allied peoespecially France United States of America, those ties of friendship and co-operation so greatly strengthened by our common endurance of hardships and perils of war. I share your confidence in the ability of the League of Nations to foster the spirit of reliance on the right and forbearance, instead of suspicion and armed strength and thus to contribute effectively toward the establishment of peace on a firm and lasting foundation

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

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












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
