METEOROLOGICAL SERVICE OF CANADA. Fine Today—Showers To-morrow. Toronto, April 29, 11 p.m.—The pressure is highest to-night over the eastern portion of the continent and lowest in the North-west Territories.

Local Temperatures—The highest and lowest readings of the thermometer at the Observatory on Saturday, 28th April, 1894, were:—Highest, 67° above; lowest, 32.5° above.

The Walkerville Railway Company is erecting a handsome new station south of the G. T. R. depot at St. Thomas. It is of modern architecture, and will doubtless be an ornament to that city when completed.

The hotel men of Guelph have formed a combination and decided to use coal oil lamps instead of gas or electric light. They wanted a special rate from the gas company, and, being refused, will cease to patronize the company.

On Friday night Mr. A. Darrach let the contracts for a three-story red pressed brick building, with brown stone facings, on Talbot street, east of the post office, St. Thomas, for Mr. Duncombe, comprising three stores and opera house capable of seating 1,200 in rear, offices and lodge rooms on second story and lodge rooms on third story.

The Lake Erie & Detroit River R.R. take control of the Port Stanley Railroad on Tuesday next. Their time table provides for a train reaching London at 8:45 a.m. and leaving London at 5:10 p.m.

The Whitney Opera Company, presenting Messrs. De Koven and Smith's most tuneful opera, "The Fencing Master," with the charming little "Dreadenella prima donna," Miss Marie Tempess, will soon be seen in this city.

Mr. J. L. Miller, representing Mr. John Labatt, was at the Queen's Hotel, Winnipeg, last week. Rev. Robt. Aylward preached to the Hamilton Independent Oddfellows yesterday afternoon.

McGregor's boiler shop at Windsor was entered by burglars Friday night and \$50 worth of brass taken. The St. Thomas Art Club have changed the time for opening their exhibition to 10 o'clock in the morning.

Sarah Andrews, a young woman who has been in trouble before, was arrested Saturday, and remanded to jail till Monday. Mr. J. W. Martin, of the Hub, has received his license. The temporary withholding was on some technical ground purely.

Judge Hatch, of Buffalo, has preferred charge of criminal libel against C. F. Kingsley, editor, and M. R. Clissold, reporter for the Buffalo Enquirer. Chief of Police Wills, of Windsor, has been served with a writ in the suit for damages brought against him by Kirby Gregory. Damages are laid at \$5,000.

A petition is said to be in circulation, asking P. P. Boutellier, of Belle River, to run in the North Essex local campaign as an out and out annexation candidate. Mr. Arthur McLellan, of Petrolia, on the occasion of his removal to Stratford, was made the recipient of a purse of gold and an address from his personal friends.

Squire J. B. Smyth dismissed the charge against Ed. Barrell of selling after hours on Saturday, April 7, after hearing a lot of contradictory evidence on Saturday afternoon last. The Grand Trunk Gun Club held their weekly shoot at their grounds over Port Stanley bridge the other afternoon. The scoring of the members was: Booth, 16; Anderson, 15; Bowman, 15; Sanderson 14; Norris, 18; Skinner, 16.

Some time ago a merchant named Van Every, of South Woodlee, mailed a registered letter to Lassaline & Sons, of Windsor, enclosing \$27. The letter came, but instead of the money was a forged check for the amount. The department are investigating.

Mr. Joseph Gibson, ex-Mayor of Ingersoll, addressed a large gathering of men at Victoria Hall yesterday afternoon on the topic, "Do unto others as you would they should do unto you." In the evening he addressed the congregation at the King Street Methodist Church.

The Petrolia correspondent of the Oil Springs Chronicle says:—Mayor Gurd, the Independent candidate for West Lambton, is meeting with every encouragement throughout the riding, and it is not a question now whether he will be elected, but what his majority will be.

A convention of Liberal-Conservatives will be held in Mayhew's hall, Thamesville, on Friday, May 4th, at two o'clock p.m. In the evening a mass meeting will be held, at which Messrs. G. F. Marter, M. P. P. for Muskoka, and Jas. Clancey, M. P. P. for West Kent, will be present and deliver addresses.

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The Edinboro' House, on the Wellington Road, a short distance south of Clarke's Bridge, was burned down last night. The Fire Department were summoned at 10:30 o'clock, and found the building in flames.

Being a frame structure it burned quickly, and became a total wreck. The burned property adjoining was saved. The burned building is an old-timer, and was a hotel when London was a much more modest place. Some years ago the house lost its license and soon closed its doors.

Niagara Falls Record:—"Mr. William Baker, stenographer, of Stratford, Ont., former secretary of the assistant superintendent of the Grand Trunk Railway, in the division headquarters at Stratford and London, but now with the New York Central at Suspension Bridge, was in London, through his solicitor, Franklin H. Lough, of Washington, D.C., successful in securing a patent from the Government of the Dominion of Canada, on his invention, the "steno-graphic duplicator," a new device for the reproduction of facsimile writings and drawings. Foreign patents are pending."

Two city bank clerks, Chas. Blinn and C. M. McArthur, were driving down Richmond street at a rapid rate on Saturday evening about 9 o'clock, when, at the corner of King street, their buggy encountered a telephone pole. The result was a very bad one. Both occupants were thrown out. McArthur was rendered unconscious, and was moved to Dr. Graham's office, where some severe but not dangerous cuts were found on his head. Blinn was able to pick himself up. The horse was thrown on its back, the harness was pulled to pieces and the buggy was wrecked. The outfit belonged to Young's livery.

Mrs. Saunders, Horton street, formerly of London, was arrested the other day on a charge of stealing a hairbrush, and other small articles from W. S. Reid at Payne's Hotel, in London township, two or three weeks ago. The accused was driving, and stopped at the hotel, where Mr. Reid was. They met in the sitting-room, and it is alleged she snatched the articles from his hand and refused to give them back. She was held till to day, when Squire Lacey will hear the case. Detective Ward made the arrest.

A tailor named James Campbell was in Galt the other day and got on a spree. He was at the Queen's Hotel and was told to leave. Next morning early he was found lying dead outside a side door. His one eye was blackened and his nose badly bruised. He had evidently taken a dose of two bottles containing laudanum, as two bottles containing laudanum were found in his pockets. Deceased was a travelling tailor, aged about 70 years, and had recently worked at London, Delaware and Gt. Harham.

Mr. Thomas Donley will take charge of the Press House, Port Stanley, to-morrow (Monday) the day that the L. & P. S. R. R. goes into the hands of the new lessees. His lease is for two years with privilege of being extended to five years. Mr. Fraser's family will remove to this city, where they will reside for the present.

Edward McCann, who picked the lock and escaped from the St. Thomas police station on Tuesday morning, is now safe "across the river." An acquaintance of his in that city is in receipt of a letter, from which it is learned that he went from there to London, thence to Sarnia, and across to Uncle Sam's dominion.

The friends of a certain clergyman, says a Clinton paper, are joking him about some little coincidences that are said to have happened recently in his domestic circle. His wife lately presented him with a daughter, and the same evening his drinking mare had a foal, his cow had a calf and his cat five kittens.

Graham, of this city, for artificial stone walks, at the following figures:—Cement, 15 cents per square foot; cement and iron, guaranteed for five years, 18 cents; artificial granite stone, two kinds, guaranteed for five years, 21 and 24 cents.

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 27.—Nine men have met violent deaths in Madison parish in the last week, and eight of them have been lynched by infuriated citizens. The last four were hanged last night. Yesterday the Boyce assassins were hunted down by bloodhounds and finally located in the Sycamore woods. Sheriff McClelland sent for volunteers to increase his posse and a force of 300 men finally located the assassins in a negro cabin. The posse surrounded the house and found the four darkies huddled in a small crib in the loft of the cabin. The four were Pomp Clayton, leader of the assassins; Shell Clayton, foot Harvey and Torr McCloy. They were arrested and sent under guard to Fallulah. Just before reaching Fallulah a mob overpowered the guards and took the prisoners to Crescent Place, where the murder had been committed, and strung them up, where their bodies were found this morning.

Suitcase at the Falls. Niagara Falls, N. Y., April 27.—Mrs. Mary Finnigan, 50 years old, of Buffalo, committed suicide here to-day by jumping into the American rapids from Willow Island, about a mile from the Falls. Her body was carried down to a point a near the Cataract House, where, by a peculiar turn, it swam into an eddy, and a portion of her dress caught firmly on to some logs that projected from the shore, ed cribbing about 25 feet from the shore. Jack McCloy, the guide, made a most daring journey with a rope around his waist, and reached the woman, but she was dead.
