A Search For Treasure.

Since the third of this month search has been in progress in the ruins of the Del Monte hotel at Monterey for valuables that are in the fire. Gold Brick Swindle.

New York, April 21. — An evening paper prints the following: "What is to develop into a big gold brick swindle came to light to-day at the U. S. assay office. Yesterday a well known and wealthy gentleman of this city deposited a large bar supposed to be gold with an assayer to be refined and made into standard gold bars. The gentleman said the bars were from California and were estimated to be worth about \$10,000 each. He paid \$40,000 for the four, and the assayer, thinking he had made before, showed the bars to be about 74 per cent gold. The bars were returned to him and the gentleman was paid the balance and receipted for in the afternoon and the gentleman departed in

confidence that he had \$40,000 in
in the hands of "Uncle Sam." The
specimens of Graham, the possessor of
the points, were excited by the light weight
of the bars, their specific gravity being
about 89, whereas the specific gravity of
gold is 193. Samples were taken from
the four bars and assayed when it was
found that the bars were of copper with a
wash of gold on the outside. In
turn, the four bars turned out to be worth
four dollars instead of \$40,000. Up
noon to-day the gentleman had not
been able to ascertain the result of the assay.
It is evident a fraud has been perpetrated
on him and that he is numbered among
the victims of the gold brick trick."

A despatch from London says that the steamer Volta foundered off the island of Wyoomus, in the Grecian archipelago. Lieutenant John W. Daumeaur, arctic explorer, shot and killed himself at the naval academy at Annapolis yesterday morning.

The Italian parliament has been opened today by Prime Minister Depretis, in his address he said that Italy would follow in conformity with her mission to maintain peace.

A despatch from New York yesterday says: In the columns of the morning papers there appeared to day an advertisement for a 75,000 dollar draft which has been lost or stolen. The draft belongs to the Bank of North America, Philadelphia on the New York Banking Association payable to the order of Dunn Bros. Payment has been stopped.

The New York Times yesterday morning states that the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe railway is buying one million dollars worth of steel rails in England. Prominent iron men are given as authorities for the statement.

Gladstone writes that he does not desire a general election to parliament until the English mind is as ripe on the Irish question as the Welsh and Scottish minds are, and that that time is rapidly advancing. Anyhow, he says, I am prepared to face anything to defeat coercion.
