Conference of Government, Mine Inspectors, Superintendents and Managers.

Rules and Regulations for Enforcing New Act Discussed and Approved.

The amendments to the Coal Mines Regulation act, passed at last session of the legislature, are now being discussed at a conference of government, mine inspectors, superintendents and managers.

Before subjecting the men to the examination necessary to the obtaining of certificates, it was deemed advisable to hold a conference of mine inspectors, rules and regulations governing examination, for although a number of the regulations would be found able to undergo written examinations, some miners in every other way capable, are unable to write the answers to the questions.

At the meeting of the committee on the regulations, the government party covered the ground and beyond a few very trivial suggestions, the regulations were adopted. As one of them said last night, the government party evidently worked with a desire to carry out the spirit as well as the letter of the regulations.
