FAMILIES SUFFERING IN OUR MIDST

Not Necessary to go to Belgium to Find Needy People—Something Should be Done.

A citizen of the Town in his regular business learned of the fact that a number of people in the country were needing food. On investigation he found that one family consisting of seven members—of whom two were sick and incapable of working, one between sixty and seventy and another between seventy and eighty—were living in a small house without any food. They had borrowed from their neighbors and could borrow no more, as the neighbors were in the same condition. This man had a small farm and in the past was able to do lumbering work and earn wages which kept him more or less comfortable, but had no reserve strength. The winter being long and hard and being sick, placed himself and the family in this condition. He was ill and sitting at home and the family were without food. This was the case of one.

At another place the head of the family was sick, apparently with tuberculosis. There was a dead child in the family at the time of his visit, apparently had died for lack of sustenance. Some other cases almost, if not altogether as appalling, came to his notice. He made known the fact to some persons in this town and they gave him cash to help out the conditions. He bought goods—meat, molasses and such like—and took it to these suffering, starving families. The little settlement where these people live lies between the Tobique and Balmoral Settlement, and there are some seven or eight families there living. It was very difficult to reach them owing to the condition of the roads, but he finally succeeded and brought as much as his horse could haul to the families. Upon distributing it, he found that there were at least seven families in a more or less deplorable condition and needing food.

When one comes to think of it, Belgium and her suffering people do not appear to us any more earnestly than do these suffering people living at our doors and while we all exclaim that this should not be, yet if other steps are not taken to supply their needs, in addition to what this citizen was able to do, the same conditions will continue.

In some cases, these settlers have little farms upon which they could grow food if they had seed, but they are not able to get it.

We publish this statement with a view of eliciting sympathy either from the Town people or from the Government, or some one who will have energy sufficient to bring about a change in the conditions. As we sit down to our meals, although the cost of living is very apparent to us, we all have meals, let us think of our poor, suffering brethren so close to our doors who have not anything at all, and are suffering in quietness and loneliness.

Mrs. P. J. Adams of Campbellton has received word from Ottawa that her husband, Pte. J. Adams is seriously ill, having been wounded in the shoulder and knee on May 5th. He is now at the 17th General Hospital, France. Pte. Adams enlisted with the 115th Battalion and has been in the trenches for sometime. Pte. Stanley Adams who went over with the 26th Battalion and who was wounded last September and returned in March and is now in the Convalescent Hospital in St. John is a brother of Pte. P. J. Adams, also Pte. George Adams and another brother is now in France.

Word has been received that Pte. Gordon Sherwood of New Carlisle is now in Hospital in France, suffering with trench fever. Many friends hope for a speedy recovery.

Paris, May 22.—Noon.—Three separate counter-attacks by the Germans on positions captured by the French were repulsed last night, according to an official statement issued by the War Office this morning.

The number of prisoners taken by the French yesterday was 1,000.

Washington, May 22.—President Wilson today signed the bill increasing the size of the navy from 87,000 to 150,000 men and the marine corps from 17,000 to 30,000.

RAILWAY SERVICE NEEDS ATTENTION

New Time Table Going Into Effect Early in June Should be Examined

The Graphic understands that the new time cards for the C. G. R. and I. N. R. are being prepared. The new cards will go into effect early in June.

It is important that certain improvements be made to the train service in and out of Campbellton. For the first time in over twenty years Campbellton has had no day train arriving here from east in the morning and leaving for points east in the evening. In consequence of this much trade has been driven from Campbellton and thousands of dollars lost to our town.

A year ago a suburban was run between Newcastle and Campbellton. This was a very convenient train and worked up a large traffic but was taken off shortly after New Year because of lack of motive power.

It is necessary that this train be again put on the route, but we understand that no provision is being made to do so. If such is the case it is time for our merchants to get together and insist upon proper recognition of our claims.

Not only this train, but a schedule of all local trains should be procured by a strong committee of merchants and the whole service discussed and recommendations made which will convince the management that we are alive to our own interests.

Important changes are also to be made in the running of trains on the International.

It is too bad our Board of Trade is dead. An effort should be made to have it reorganized and take up its duties.

This is a matter that needs instant and spontaneous action in our town. Now get busy.

Since the above was written a meeting of the Board of Trade has been called for Friday evening to discuss these matters. Every business man whether a member of the Board or not should attend.

FLAT LANDS

Miss Elsie McLeod of Flatlands has received a very interesting letter from her brother, Pte. Percy McLeod who is now in hospital in Edinburgh, Scotland, in which he says:—

"Just a few lines to let you know that I am well, hope you are the same. I am in the hospital here and having a dandy time, all I have to do now is sleep and eat. I tell you 'tis some change from the trenches. This is not a soldier's evening, they never had any soldier's here until a few months ago and so they are pretty good to us."

I suppose you have read all about the big push at Vimy Ridge. I know there is a dot in the papers here about it, well I went over the top with the battalion in that push last Monday morning, it was just breaking day when we jumped out of our trenches and went across to "No Man's Land" to see Old Fritz. I tell you it was some sight to see him send up his lights, they were red, orange, blue and white and a green light that went up in the air about a thousand feet and burst into a lot of green balls. Our artillery when he started was louder than any thunder you ever heard and the flash of the guns was brighter than lightning. They say it was one of the greatest battles the Canadians were ever in. We got into our new positions and I stopped with them about forty-eight hours, then my feet got sore and I came out to see the doctor and he shipped me off to "Blighty".

ARCHIBALD SETTLEMENT

Mrs. A. M. Rosengreen of Archibald Settlement has received word from her son being wounded in which he says:—

that Pte. W. A. Rosengreen of my section was wounded by shrapnel during a recent engagement and no doubt is now in kind hands in hospital. He and the rest of his crew were advancing in an attack under shell fire when he got hit. I trust that it will not be long before he recovers because a boy of his calibre is hard to find every day. He was strong, cheerful and a great favorite with the boys and I saw speedy promotion for him, and I shall keep tab on him from time to time though I do not doubt that you will hear from him quicker than I could write do not worry over it, as he has done his duty well and I think he has all the necessary strength to pull through. I shall be pleased to supply any further information.

HANOVER STREET TO BE EXTENDED

Offers of Havelock Sansom and Dr. McNichol Accepted—Other Business

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Clerk's office, Tuesday evening, His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding.

There were present Councillors, Quinn, Harquail, Patterson, Miller, McBeath, Alexander and Evans.

A communication was read from Arthur Oullette claiming damages for the loss of a barrel of flour which was spilled out from his wagon on Ramsey street on May 12th by the bad condition of the street.

This was referred to the Public Property and Streets committee.

A communication from Mr. C. A. Sullivan claiming \$50.00 damages for loss of water and sewerage flooding his cellar was read and referred to the Water and Sewerage committee. Applications for trucking licenses were read from Geo. Dunn, A. J. Arsenault and A. Blakely. These were referred to the Police and License committee.

The matter of the extension of Hanover Street to Abbot Street was again taken up.

Coun. Patterson moved that the offer of Havelock Sansom agreeing to sell all the land in four simple 62' lots of his property for \$930.00 and to remove all buildings be accepted—Carried.

Coun. McBeath moved that Dr. McNichol's offer in reference to east street be also accepted. This was to be made in the running of trains on the International.

The matter of dispute between the Town and the McLennan Foundry & Machine Works Ltd. in reference to electric power has been settled, a check for the balance due as agreed upon having been handed the town treasurer.

Mr. Wm. Currie was appointed a member of the School Board in place of Mrs. A. A. Andrew whose term had expired.

Coun. McBeath moved that the Graphic be given the Department By-laws to print and the Tribune the Law Cards—Carried.

Coun. Harquail reported that the Electric Light committee were considering the matter of extending the electric lights to Andersonville and would report later.

Coun. Harquail moved that the matter of printing the Town By-laws be left with the Finance Committee until proposed new by-laws are drafted—Carried.

Coun. Harquail suggested that the Building Inspector have certain specified office hours, so that applicants for building permits would know when to find him. He also suggested that the owner of the shack on Water Street burned Tuesday morning be notified to remove same promptly.

The Waverly ruins were also up for discussion and the Clerk instructed to write the owners in reference to same.

A letter from the ladies of the W. C. T. U. re curfew and compulsory education, and requests for financial grants from the Roman Catholic and Salvation Army were ordered placed on file.

The meeting then adjourned.

KOPPEL'S BAKERY BADLY GUTTED

Shortly after five o'clock Tuesday morning an alarm was rung in for a blaze in Koppel's bakery. The fire broke out in the building was gutted and stock ruined.

This was one of the original shacks on Water Street and the fire spread through the entire building before the alarm was sounded. The firemen were soon on the scene and extinguished the fire but the stock was entirely ruined.

The fire was caused by the overturning of a pot of fat which caught fire. Mr. Koppel when he saw he could not extinguish the blaze, rushed upstairs and helped his wife and daughter out. He returned to get his pocket book, watch and other valuables but failed and had to jump out an upstairs window. He then had to run to box 31, ring in a alarm, consequently the fire had a great start before the firemen appeared.

Mr. Koppel's loss will be heavy as he has only \$1000. on his stock and bakery equipment.

NOTES

The firemen made a record run to the fire.

The need of another alarm box on Water Street was made evident. Another shack has been removed. They will soon all be gone.
