### DECISIONS MADE

BY PHARMACISTS

To dispense no liquor if it could be handled for medical purposes by any other system, to preserve the Canadian market for Canadian made goods, to accord to the returned soldier pharmaceutical graduate the most generous treatment possible in the matter of inter-provincial reciprocity of diplomas, and to meet in Montreal in 1920, were among the notable decisions at the Friday session of the Pharmaceutical Convention at Winnipeg.

The new officers were elected, J. R. Barnabe, Montreal, being chosen as the Dominion president for the ensuing year.

### LIQUOR PRICES TO BE LOWER.

New Regulations in Effect on November 1.

Controlled prices of liquor, sold on physicians' prescriptions in New Brunswick, will go into effect on Nov. 1, when the present wholesale and retail vendors licenses expire.

Conferences have resulted in the fixing of the profits, which will be allowed and, it is stated, that wholesalers will carry on at a 20 per cent. basis, while retail vendors will be allowed to add 22 1/2 per cent. to the cost of liquors as their profits.

Vendors say that standard brands of Scotch whiskey, which have been selling at \$3.50, will retail at about \$2.75 per bottle of 24 ounces, under the new system, while there will be a similar reduction in prices of other liquors. The new price lists will be published and vendors will be subject to penalties for selling in advance of the schedule which will be posted in their establishments.
