RASMUSSEN TO HEAD EXPEDITION

Will Leave Denmark for North American Arctic Archipelago.

Copenhagen, March 24.—The announcement has just been made here that Knud Rasmussen, the explorer, will head an expedition which will leave Denmark this year for the North American Arctic Archipelago to investigate the life and conditions of the Eskimos and to complete the survey of Baffin Land and adjacent territory. The Danish government will contribute 100,000 kroner to the support of the expedition which will leave Copenhagen on board the motor ship Solkongen and will remain in the field about two years.

TO OPPOSE BILL PROHIBITING STALLS IN RESTAURANTS AT ST. JOHN

St. John, N. B., April 11.—The bill, which was initiated by the common council and which is now before the legislature at Fredericton, providing for the prohibition of stalls in restaurants in this city, is to be opposed, so it was announced at the common council committee meeting this morning. Mayor Schofield and Commissioner Thornton, of the public safety department, will go to Fredericton to-morrow to support the matter before the legislature.
