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DROWNED WHILE
STREAM-DRIVING
Newcastle, N. B. July 8.—Joseph Taylor, aged 16 years, of Exmore, about 25 miles from this place, was drowned Friday afternoon while helping his father stream drive at Exmore. He was running on the logs when he fell off and was drowned. The body was recovered in about five minutes and everything done to resuscitate him, but no avail, his being revived when he was taken from the water. He is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Milton Taylor and several brothers and sisters.

DIES AS RESULT
OF INJURIES
Michael O'Shaghnessy Was Thrown From Wagon On Thursday Last
Newcastle, N. B., July 8.—The death of Michael O'Shaghnessy occurred at his home on Chaplain Island Road last evening. Deceased was one of the best known citizens of northern New Brunswick. For many years he was a locomotive engineer on the northern division of the Canadian National Railway and for the past five years driver of the Ocean Limited and Maritime Expresses between Moncton and Campbellton. He retired on pension about a year ago and has since devoted his time to farming. On Thursday while he was driving a team repairing the road near his home his horses took fright and ran away. He was thrown off, striking on his shoulders and so badly injuring himself that he never recovered from his injuries. Mr. O'Shaghnessy was a former member of Agricultural Society No. 123 and has been a member of the Board of Directors for many years. He was for a time a member of the County Council, representing North E. B. Parish for two terms. Besides his widow he is survived by one son, Patrick L. O'Shaghnessy, at home, and one daughter, Mary (Mrs. McKinnon), Buffalo, N. Y.

After an illness of three months borne with fortitude and christian resignation, Marjorie Gerrard, beloved wife of the late Mr. Gerrard, died at the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital on Thursday, July 8th, at the comparatively early age of fifty six years. An aged mother, a brother and a wide circle of relatives and friends mourn their loss. In the parlour of Miss Gerrard the home and the church lose a devoted daughter and a faithful worker. Although not physically robust during recent years she entered with rare enthusiasm into the fields of Christian Service. An officer of the Soldiers' Memorial Hospital Aid, Presbyterian of the Women's Missionary Society an indefatigable worker in the Soldiers' Memorial Aid, Secretary for a number of years of the Women's Christian Temperance Union of Campbellton and for the past eighteen years the devoted and painstaking Secretary of St. Andrew's Sunday School her duties leave a gap that will be hard to fill. She lived for others. But the excellence of her service was eclipsed by the beauty of her character. She was a woman of winning and strong personality. In her life the fruits of the Spirit ever abounded for she walked in His steps. Now she rests from her labors and her works do follow her. The funeral services were conducted at the home of her brother, Mr. E. Barbery Gerrard, on Saturday afternoon by her minister the Rev. W. W. McDonald. Interment was made in the rural cemetery.
