CELEBRATED QUEBEC CASE COMES TO END
Body of Alphonse Roy to Be Buried in St. Charles Cemetery, Quebec.

The Quebec Telegraph says:—
A petition to exhumate the body of her husband, the late Alphonse Roy, from the cemetery of St. Joseph de Levis, for burial in St. Charles Cemetery, was presented by Dame Belzine Roy and granted by Mr. Justice Cannon in the Superior Court, Quebec, Saturday morning. This is the last proceedings in the case of Roy vs. Roy et al, which went as far as the Court of Review and is termed a celebrated case.

It will be remembered by Telegraph readers, that the late Alphonse Roy, who in his lifetime was a well-known hotel-keeper, conducting a restaurant on St. Augustin street, died a couple of years ago, and was buried in St. Charles Cemetery. Relatives of the late Mr. Roy had the body exhumed and taken over to St. Joseph de Levis and interred in the cemetery there. Mrs. Roy, the widow, subsequently discovering this, took action in the Superior Court for the return of the body to St. Charles Cemetery and won her case. The matter was brought to the Court of Review, and the widow was again successful, and the final order above stated, is the culmination.

FOX PROSPECTUS
CHARGED TO BE FALSE
Manager J. R. Bigger, of the New Glasgow Silver Black Fox Co., Arrested.

The Eastern Chronicle says it has developed that there was something doing internally with the New Glasgow Silver Black Fox Company, Ltd. Its managing director, J. R. Bigger, was arrested on a warrant issued by Magistrate Macfarlane on the complaint of D. O. Kiser, who charged that "J. R. Bigger, a promoter and managing director of the New Glasgow Silver Black Fox Company, Limited, a body corporate, made or published or concurred in making or publishing a statement showing that the said company had \$20,000 on deposit in the bank; that the foxes were pure bred Prince Edward Island foxes and that the company would pay or guarantee a dividend of 25 per cent. for the present year, which statements were false, as the said J. R. Bigger well knew, with the intent to induce persons to become shareholders in the said company, contrary to the form of the criminal code, section No. 414."

Bigger was remanded. Mr. R. H. Graham, K. C., appeared for the complainant and it is understood that a second purchaser of stock has had issued a warrant along the same lines as Mr. Kiser.
Section 414 of the criminal code, under which the action has been taken, is very clear with regard to prospectuses and statements made or published by directors when disposing of stock and a very heavy penalty is attached.

INDEPENDENCE DAY IN UNITED STATES

Celebrations Started Early On Saturday Morning.—Patriotic Speeches, Etc.

Washington, July 4.—The wheels of the Government practically were at a standstill to-day while the National capital joined in with other cities and hamlets of the nation in celebration of Independence Day. There were no sessions of Congress, the White House virtually was deserted, the executive departments were closed and President Wilson and other officials of the Government laid aside official duties to participate in patriotic celebrations here or elsewhere.

The itinerary of the various officials took President Wilson to Philadelphia for a day.
New York, July 4.—A sunrise meeting in Central Park at which patriotic addresses were delivered marked the opening of the official celebration of Independence Day in New York city.

Except for the display of flags from almost every building and house there was nothing to distinguish the day from any other holiday. An occasional pop of a fire cracker or blank cartridge recalled other Fourth's before the ban was placed on powder producing noise makers.

With safety and sanity as the chief aim of the official celebration committee, Fire Commissioner Adamson early in the day enlisted the aid of the police to make it a fireless holiday as well. Not a single fire works permit has been issued by the fire department.

To-night the city will be in a blaze of light from thousands of electric bulbs placed on the towering domes of Manhattan office buildings and in public parks.

Eight airmen entered for a mixed aeroplane and ying boat race over an all water course, above the Hudson River and New York Bay, the most sensational feature of the day's offerings. The race is said to be the first in this country in which engines have been powered above an horse power and with flying boats competing with the lighter and, presumably swifter land going machines.
