



The only way to make High Park valuable to our citizens is to give us free and seasy access to it, and no plan so good as the one suggested of opening College-street. It can be done on the local improvement plan: assess College-street east as far as Bathurst-street or even Spadim-avenue, as it would improve the whole street from Yonge. In fact it would increase the value of all the property near College. The assessment for it could be divided into three parts. All west of Dufferin in the first part, all between Dufferin and Dovercourt in the second part and all between Doversourt and Bathurst-streets in the third part.
