Great was the surprise the following Monday, when the report went around that Mr. Stirrett, of London, was to run as a Liberal in East Lambton. Little credence was given to the report until notice was received calling another convention for October 9th. Liberals from the north went to this meeting in goodly numbers to defeat this movement, but their motion to "not place a candidate in the field" was ruled "out of order," and they withdrew from the convention. They believe that the cause of Liberalism in East Lambton will be best served by supporting the Progressive candidate.
