You will save money by purchasing your Tickets before entering the cars.

CHECK YOUR BAGGAGE and the Company will then be responsible for it. Baggage in Passenger Cars is a source of anxiety to the owner; causes inconvenience to others; and is unsightly and altogether out of place.

Bazaar can be checked through from places in Canada to the United States and vice versa; but in such cases the law requires each Passager to point out his Baggage to the Customs' Officers at the Frontier Station, in order that it may be examined.

Avoid altercations with Conductors or other Employees of the Company. Conductors have very responsible and arduous duties to perform on the journey, which require the utmost diligence on their part, and they have not time to enter into long discussions.

Eras and Cycles for 1876.

The year 1876, which comprises the latter part of the one thousand and the beginning of the one hundred and next year of the Independence of the United States of America, corresponds to

The year 6389 of the Julian Period;

The year 7345-56 of the Byzantine Era;

The year 5836-37 of the Jewish Era;

The year 2629 since the foundation of Rome, according to Varro;

The year 2023 since the beginning of the era of Nones;

The year 262 of the Olympiad, or the third year of the great Olympiad;

The year 2-88 of the Gravian era, or the era of the Salvatic;

The year 1592 of the era of Diocletian;

The year 1593 of the Mohammedan era;

Easter, April 4

Solar Cycle, 9

Golden Number, 15

Roman Indiction, 1

Jewish Law cycle, 12

Divisorial Period, 205

that date. It was found convenient to put the first seven letters of the alphabet successively against the days of the month, putting A to January 1, and repeating the seven letters as often as may be necessary through the year. Of course all Sundays in the year, except in leap-year, will have the same letter that falls to the first one; thus, the Dominical Letter enables us to find on what day in the week a given day in the year falls.

The Epoch is the moon's age at the beginning of the year.

The Solar Cycle is a period of twenty-eight years, so called because in the twenty-eighth year after any year which may be taken, all the days of the week fall on the same days of the month as they fall in that year. One of these cycles was finished in 1872, and 1874 is the second year in the next cycle.

Nineteen years are very nearly equal to a whole number of lunar months; hence, once in 19 years, the phases of the moon fall on the same days. These years are numbered up from one to nineteen, and the Golden Number marks the position of the year in this cycle, nineteen.

The Roman Indiction is a cycle of fifteen years, used in the Middle Ages, but wholly chronological. The first one began January 1, A.D. 3-3.

The Julian Period begins with the induction, the solar cycle, and the lunar cycle all begin together, and is therefore 15 x 19 x 18 years in length, 7985 years.

The Dominical Letter, etc.

The Council of Nice, in the year 325, made rules that Easter Sunday should be the first Sunday after that full moon which comes on March 21, or next after
