

HIGHLIGHTS

1. During the 1980s, the number of Canadian Trade Office reports increased significantly. In 1980, 10 reports were issued, while in 1984, 25 reports were issued. This increase reflects the growing importance of trade relations between Canada and the United States, particularly in the areas of energy, minerals, and technology.
2. Virtually all Trade Office reports identify specific areas of potential trade growth. For example, reports from the Pacific region often highlight opportunities in the areas of forestry, agriculture, and services. Reports from the Caribbean and Latin America focus on trade in raw materials and manufactured goods.
