left the Quebec seminary and Laval university of which he was the rector, to be appointed archbishop of Regina. His salary was \$120 a year. He performed his duties not to earn money but to help his country, just in the same way as did the pioneers of education when this country was in its cradle. These things cannot be forgotten. The sacrifices that have been made in the past, centuries ago, by men and women of courage, of education at its best, men and women with a big heart, are things that cannot be forgotten—a great many have followed in the tradition they established—and this is why. People come from all parts of Canada to the seats of learning in the province of Quebec in order to get the best education that is given in Canada.

Mr. Fournier (Hull): Tomorrow is government day. We will take up the resolution in the name of the Prime Minister (Mr. St. Laurent) concerning emergency legislation, then the resolution which is the basis of a bill to constitute a department of defence production; then second reading of Bill No. 5, to amend the Canadian Wheat Board Act, 1935, and second reading of Bill No. 6, respecting the appointment of auditors for national railways. We could conclude the day by taking up the resolution concerning amendments to the Indian Act.
