SASKATCHEWAN—PRESERVATION OF INDIAN SHRINE

When I asked a question regarding the Mistaseni shrine and a meeting with the P.F.R.A., the minister said that he hoped to have an answer within a few days. Hon. J. J. Greene (Minister of Agriculture): Mr. Speaker, with regard to the question of the hon. member, I might point out that questions 172 and 576 on the order paper in this regard were answered on January 21 and February 10 respectively.

I might point out further—and I believe the right hon. Leader of the Opposition also is concerned in this matter—that there have been meetings between the P.F.R.A. officials and the concerned parties. One of the fears of the hon. member with regard to the time element in this matter is ill founded, in that this work can well be carried out next February, when at that time the water is lowered by the dam. So there is no imminent danger of flooding, precluding the work being done as the hon. member feared.

The P.F.R.A. officials and the local officials are working together to find some method whereby this very valuable and important shrine can be preserved at some reasonably economic cost. I think this is the problem.
