The main reasons why the Francophone community is so poorly represented in the scientific research area are:

- (1) Due to greatly diversified areas in which scientists are employed there are not enough Francophone graduates to cover all the scientific fields. The universities in Quebec, which are our main source of Francophone PHD's, although turning out highly qualified graduates cannot hope to cover every field of research.
- (2) On many occasions scientists whom we would have employed had no interest in working outside of the province of Quebec. The Public Service Commission has made special efforts to convince scientists that the National Capital Region area is a bicultural area but we have had little success.
- (3) Treasury Board secretariat has completed a study that indicates that the problem of imbalance also exists in the provincial public service of Quebec where a high percentage of positions are filled by Anglophones. The provincial government is attempting to rectify that situation. Under those circumstances the federal government will be in competition with the provincial government for scientists in the same field.
