Chick Evans Beaten In the First Round

MANCHESTER, Va., Sept. 1.—The first of the favorites for the national amateur golf title was eliminated in the first round today when Charles Evans, Jr., of Edgewater, national champion in 1913 and a prominent figure in the recent open championship tournament, was eliminated by Eben M. Byers of the Allegheny Country Club, Pittsburgh, national champion in 1906 and runner-up in 1902 and 1903, by the score of one up.

Jerome Travers, the title-holder, was carried to the seventeenth hole before he could win from J. B. Schlotman of Detroit.

Travers will meet Byers tomorrow in what is expected to be the feature match of the tournament.

Francis Outimet, last year's open champion and the French amateur title-holder, had to play the full round to dispose of M. R. Marston of Baltimore.

SEVERE REPRIMAND FROM HEALTH BOARD

Muskoka Hotel Proprietor Threatened With Prosecution for Obsequies.

A hard jolt was handed out recently by the provincial board of health to a delinquent and defiant hotel proprietor in Muskoka. The man was told that unless certain steps prescribed by the department were taken in short order his place would be placarded to warn the public of danger, and that proceedings would be taken against him under the act within 24 hours. It is understood that he is now following out instructions.

The case, according to Dr. R. W. Bell, provincial inspector, is one of three years' standing. The hotel in question is one of the largest and most popular on the Muskoka Lakes, and every year has 300 persons at a time on the guest list. Nevertheless the water supplied to the tables is subject to the most serious manner of contamination, and the repeated warnings of the department have produced no change for the better. It appears that the refuse water from a large laundry in proximity to the hotel is emptied into the bay within sixty feet of the intake pipe. The board claims that such a situation is dangerous, and would rapidly deplete the number of tourists if it were understood.

Dr. Bell, in company with District Officer Clinton, waited on the proprietor, who was indifferent to their orders. The ultimatum was then extended.

Conditions in the lakes are reported to be improving. One hotel in Sparrow Lake had a sewage water rushing off along the intake pipe and will be remedied at once. The majority of the boarding places have expressed a desire to co-operate with the officials.

According to promise the boats of the Muskoka Navigation Company have been fitted up with special tanks, but only two or three of these are in working order. The department has been notified that by the spring of 1915 every boat on the lakes will have the equipment.
