Labor Man Objects to Statement of J. C. Watters During

RAILWAY SITUATION

Greater Toronto Labor Party Holds Convention and Discusses Plans.

1. C. Watters, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canwho addressed the convention of the Greater Toronto Labor party, held at the Labor Temple on Saturday, stated that, in his opinion, Premier Lloyd George of Britain was the trickiest little politician in England. This statement brought R. Amos at once to his feet. "Will the president inform me if the speaker made use of the words 'tricklest little politician'?" he asked. He received a reply in the affirmative. "Well, as an Englishman, I strongly object to such terms as that made relative to our premier." he fired back.

Mr. Watters, in the course of his address, referred in scathing terms to the "railway manipulations" effect-ed by both Sir Donald Mann and Sir William Mackenzie, and charged them with having practically bankrupted the C.N.R. to fill the coffers of the contracting firm of Mackenzie and Mann. He stated that he felt im-pelled to touch upon the fniquities of governments and individuals because only by doing so could he point to only by doing so could be point to the undoubted need of political action among labor men thruout the world, and especially in Canada. While he and especially in Canada. While he agreed with Samuel Compers as to the immense power wielded by trades unionism as shown in the forced pussage of the eight-hour law in the United States among certain sections of labor, he was equally impressed with the need of power along poli-tical lines. As to the members of lines. As to the members of houses at Ottawa, he characterthem in general terms as the miserable, sordid, servile and dependent lot of men to be found anywhere in the world.
