Washington, April 11.-In the house to-day Representative Sulzer of New York made a strong plea for congressional action in putting a stop to the lestruction of Niagara Falls.

He said that the preservation of the grandest picture in Nature's art gallery, Niagara Falls, was one of the serious matters before congress, but no action has been taken concerning the matter notwithstanding a number of bills were pending.

He said the Province of Ontario had granted a number of franchises to commercial interests in Ontario to use the water for power if taken from Nia-gara River, and that the Province of

gara River, and that the Province of Ontarlo was receving \$3000,000 in the Way of taxes for these franchises. The State of New York, he said, had granted more franchises to take water from the Niagara River, and it was not receiving a dollar for the privilege.

"It's a sacrilege," Mr. Sulzer said, "to this beneration, and an outrage on generations unborn to devastate this wonderful waterfall. We must protect Niagara Falls."
