MR. LAURIER NOW IN OTTAWA

The Premier-Designate to Visit
Aberdeen To-day.

LIKELY MEN FOR CABINET POSITIONS.

Sir Richard Cartwright is Not in It for the
Portfolio of Finance.

This will go to Mr. Fielding-Mr. Edgar named as the Next
Speaker of the Commons-Hon. David Mills to Ascend the
Supreme Court Bench and Leave Politics-Messrs. Mulock
and Paterson to Get the Controlships, with Salaries In-
creased to \$7,000-Mr. Somerville, of North Brant, to Get

Ottawa, July 9 (Special).—"The King is dead, long live the King!"
Two thousand people welcomed Mr. Laurier when he arrived here at 8.35
to-night in response to His Excellency's summons.

Beyond three hearty cheers when the Premier-designate alighted, there
was no further demonstration.
Accompanied by Mr. Belcourt, M.P., Mr. Laurier drove immediately to the
Russell House, where a large crowd was waiting him.

After registering, he shook hands with a few acquaintances and then re-
turned to his room.

Presently an orderly from Government House made his appearance at
the Russell, and it was soon learned that an appointment for an interview
with His Excellency had been arranged for to-morrow morning.

Those who came up with Mr. Laurier were Maj. Sutherland, Messrs. Tarte,
Borden and Fisher. Jimmy Connes, the rejected candidate of Nipissing, had
tagged himself onto the party evidently, but he was not wanted. He has no
show for a portfolio.

No State Before Saturday or Monday.

From present appearances, Mr. Laurier will not be able to submit his slate
to His Excellency until Saturday or Monday. The difficulty lies in the West-
ern representation, but it is thought Mr. Sifton will be the man. Mr. Martin
is cordially detested even by the Grits, and no one wants him in office. British
Columbia does not appear likely to get an office.

Some very funny reports were in circulation all the afternoon respecting

signate did not put in an appearance. In the vicinity of the Council chamber
for some hours there was a knot of expectant lookers-on, mostly French-Can-
adians, who wanted to see the arrival of the first French-Canadian Premier
of Canada. As was observed to-day, they evidently expected him to arrive on
a big elephant, caparisoned in crimson and gold, but were doomed to disap-
pointment. He came without ostentation.

May Drive British from Africa.

The Revolt in Mashonaland, The London
Telegraph Thinks, Has Become
Very Formidable.

London, July 9.-A Bulawayo de-
patch to The Telegraph says the ex-
pedition into the Matopos Hills against
the Matabeles has been temporarily
abandoned. The Afrikaner corps re-
fuses to fight owing to dissatisfaction
with the conditions of the service.

An editorial commenting upon its
African despatches as showing that
the forces there are insufficient to cope
with the rebellion, The Telegraph
says:

"The friendly Mashonas cannot be
trusted, and the Imperial and Chartered
Company's interests are in many
ways conflicting. The rebels are be-
ginning to adopt our military tactics.
The difficulty of transportation by re-
ason of the rinderpest threatens to
cause a famine."

The article concludes by urging the
Government, before it is too late, to
organize a force to crush the revolt,
which threatens to drive the British
from Africa.
