Chapter of Casualties.

Three Persons Drowned Off Stony Point, Lake Erie.

Two Young Men Lost Their Lives in the St. Lawrence-Related Passenger Caught His Train and Died From Excitement.

THREE WERE DROWNED.
Buffalo, April 7.—Angus McPhee, 22 years old; Rhoddy Costello, 20 years old, and Thomas Stack, aged 35, were drowned yesterday off Stony Point, on Lake Erie, by the sinking of the dredge Brian Boru. A heavy gale was blowing and the dredge sprang a leak. Before she could be towed to shallow water she foundered. Four other members of the crew were rescued.

BOTH DROWNED.
Brockville, April 7.—Word has reached here of the drowning of P. P. Hart and Jas. Byers, of Grindstone Island, who were aged 23 and 19 respectively, in the catastrophes happened within 100 rods of home by the upsetting of their sailboat. The family said the boat went in when it went down. Three men went to the rescue, but having to go a mile for a boat, were too late to save them.

KILLED BY EXCITEMENT.
Toronto, April 7.—Alex. McCabe, a farmer living near Bolton, was somewhat late as he set out for the Bolton and fearing he would miss the train, he grew excited as he and his horse along. The excitement was fatal. McCabe caught the train, but just after reaching his seat he fell dead of heart disease. At Kleinburg his body was laid in the station and sent home on the next train.

FATAL ACCIDENT AT GALT.
Galt, Ont., April 7.—Thomas Field, clerk of the division court and one of the oldest and best known residents of Galt, died at his residence here this evening. Deceased, who was 74 years of age, attended church Sunday morning, and on his return home, while walking through the kitchen, accidentally stumbled over a tub that stood in the way, causing a serious rupture of the bowels. An operation was performed, but it failed to save his life. A widow, four sons and one daughter survive him.

MONKEYED WITH A PISTOL.
Montreal, April 7.—A young man named John Trayner, employed as a clerk at Coteau Station, was brought to the Montreal hospital suffering from what is believed to be a fatal wound. He went accidentally to a revolver, which he was holding in his hand, and fired it, lodging in the region of the heart. He is not expected to recover.

A BRAKEMAN MANGLED.
Kingston, Ont., April 7.—Geo. Bourdeau, a brakeman on the K. and P. R. Railway, was run over by a train on a Grand Trunk track to his home on a box car and was run over, his legs were cut off and his body terribly mangled.

DR. RENNIE INJURED.
Hamilton, April 7.—Dr. Rennie was seriously injured in a runaway accident on Emerald street yesterday. He was thrown from his buggy and rendered unconscious. His collar bone was fractured, and his head badly bruised. He regained consciousness in about an hour, but could not explain the cause of his accident.

DIED ON THE CAR.
Chatham, April 7.—Mrs. Lamont, wife of Mr. Lachlan Lamont, died suddenly on the train. She had been on a visit to her sister, and was returning when death came. The lady had been an invalid for several years.

TRIPLIETS AT BERLIN.
Mrs. Bergman Presents Her Husband With Three Healthy Babies.

Berlin, Ont., April 7.—On Monday night a surprise came to Mr. and Mrs. Bergman, a German couple living in Berlin. The surprise consisted in the arrival of triplets at the home. The mother and babies are all doing well.

VEERING AROUND.
Democrats Throughout the West Generally Victorious.

Chicago, April 7.—In the aldermanic elections here the reform element won on a pledge to demand compensation for all franchisees.

Milwaukee went Democratic-Populist, and the entire city ticket went through with a 6,000 plurality.

Throughout Missouri the returns show partial or total victories for the Democrats.

In Arkansas the Democrats were not even opposed, except in three or four cases.

In Minnesota party lines were not drawn, but a few towns voted on the liquor question and favored license.

In Kansas the women were beaten where they really fought, and in other places polled a very light vote.

At Leadville the Silver Republicans won; at Tacoma the straight Republicans.

No Warships From the Lakes.

Great Britain to Forbid Use of Canals in Case of Spanish War.

Washington, April 7.—It has been definitely ascertained that Great Britain will forbid the use of the St. Lawrence River canals to United States war vessels in the event of war with Spain. This decision has been made to enforce vessels designed to be used as war vessels on the Atlantic coast.

In consequence of the above information every effort, it is learned, will be made to get the revenue cutter Gresham and the tugboat, both on the great lakes, through the canals before the actual declaration of hostilities.

The Gresham is sister ship of the cutter Manning, now at the Norfolk navy yard, and has been ordered to be at the seaboard from Milwaukee, and the tugboat, both on the great lakes, through the canals before the actual declaration of hostilities.

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From the mouth of the St. Lawrence to Montreal are several canal locks, which must be gone through, and with exception these locks are under English control. The English contention is based on the ground that to pass the revenue cutters through the locks during actual hostilities will serve as a basis for Spain to lay claim to damages.

The Washington authorities now have no hope of getting the new revenue cutters Onondaga and Algonquin down from the lakes. These latter vessels are at Cleveland, O., where rush work has been conducted in their construction. In four weeks' time both ships will be ready for service. The British neutrality stand, however, makes almost certain the retention of these vessels on the lakes.

News From The Capital.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Ottawa, April 7.—The bill to incorporate the Pacific steel companies of Canada came up for consideration at the private bills committee yesterday. Mr. Wood (Hamilton) had charge of the bill. Those asking for incorporation are: John McLaren, Brockville; G. B. Douglas, New York; Alexander Fraser and J. MacLaren, Ottawa; P. P. Vandevort, Pittsburg; G. A. Cox, Toronto; N. Dymont, Barrie; Alexander Wood, John Moodie and John Patton, Hamilton.

The preamble of the bill was adopted, and the bill was discussed clause by clause. Some of the clauses were held over for further consideration, but the main features of the bill were passed. Power to acquire stock in other companies was withheld for the present. The company will have power to acquire mines and operate, construct railways and telegraph, and acquire vessels for navigation, etc. The capital stock of the company is placed at \$20,000,000. The head office will be at Hamilton. Power asked to construct from mines and furnaces of the company to existing railways was held over. The bill will no doubt be put through at the next meeting of the committee.

There was a meeting of the public accounts committee for papers yesterday, when several motions for papers were adopted. Mr. McDonnell (Saskatchewan) asked for accounts in the Manitoba election of 1905. Mr. Hughes, for the account in the inquiry into charges against Indian Agent McPhee, of Kamouristag, moved that Douglas Stewart, inspector of penitentiaries, attend next meeting with the contracts for the sale of binder twine at Kingston. It was agreed to have a meeting for the transaction of business some time next week.

FLAG HAULED DOWN.
Wreck of the Maine Now Officially Abandoned by Uncle Sam.

Havana, April 7.—Lieut.-Commander Walcott has received orders to go north, his work by superintending the salvage at the wreck of the Maine being ended.

Soon after sundown last night the battered United States flag was taken from the gaff of the wrecked Maine, where it has floated since Feb. 17, two days after the explosion. The flag now rests alone in the middle of the wreck alone. Scores of brave fellows still lie entangled in the wreckage.

IRON HIGHWAYS.
Big Increase in C. P. R. Receipts—The L. E. & D. R. R. Bonus—The Rate War.

Receipts from traffic on the C. P. R. for the week ending March 31, \$41,000; for the same week last year, \$36,000; increase, \$5,000.

Mr. Walter Macgregor, clerk in the office of Mr. A. Waite, the division freight agent of the Grand Trunk, Toronto, has been transferred to the company's district freight offices at Stratford.

The L. E. and D. R. R. will ask \$2,000 from Algonquin, \$12,000 from Dunwich, \$8,000 from St. Catharines, and \$20,000 from St. Thomas for the extension of their road to the latter place from Kingston.

The secretary of the G. N. W. Central Railway Company, Manitoba, has written to the minister of railways that the company intends to carry out the construction of a line from the mouth of the Red River to the mouth of the Assiniboine, a section of the road will be built this year.

The warring railways have another try at the settlement of the passenger rate war on the 12th inst. D. McNeill, the chairman of the sub-committee of the Trucking Line Association, meeting for New York on that date. In the meantime there is no change in the situation.

SUING FOR \$10,000.
Guelph, April 7.—Mr. George Templar, husband of the woman who was killed at the Rocktonet, has filed a writ for \$10,000 damages against William Robb, of Beverly township, Templar, causing the death of Mrs. Robb's horse suddenly kicked Mrs. Templar on the head as she was passing, inflicting such injuries as to cause her death a few days afterward.
