SPAIN'S DYNASTY DOOMED.

London, May 5.—A letter just received from Madrid says Gen. Weyler and Senor Romero y Robledo, the former minister of justice, are bound to come to the front now, as "military force" has taken possession of the nation, and the Spanish dynasty, as well as the government, is doomed.

TO HEAD OFF THE SPECULATORS

Madrid, May 4.—The bill introduced in the cortes to prohibit the exportation of corn, flour, rice, maize, potatoes and fruit, and suppressing the duty on the exportation of those articles, is intended to checkmate the speculators, who, owing to the enormous premium on exchange, now 111 per cent, commenced immense exportations of produce against negotiated bills in foreign markets. The six ports have created the scarcity of food, which is largely responsible for the rioting throughout Spain.

AMERICAN LOSSES

At the Battle of Manila.

Today's Globe has the following: Valdejo, Cal., May 4.—It was late tonight when your correspondent succeeded in getting inside information bearing on the Manila affair. He was informed that late tonight Admiral Kinkaid received a telegram that 500 men were killed or wounded on the Baltimore, she having sustained the heaviest shock of the battle; and that the Olympia did the best she could with her torpedoes, destroying the shore fortifications and obstructions by means of them.

Officers here believe that the loss on the Baltimore is very serious. She carries normally some 300 men, hence her loss as reported would practically cripple her. Color is given this belief by telegraphic orders to Admiral Kinkaid to have Paymaster Stanton prepare stores of provisions and necessities for 200 men for three months. This is being done. "Without doubt," said Admiral Kinkaid, "there has been serious loss in Dewey's fleet. He went into a foreign harbor, doubtless knowing it heavily fortified, with vessels not prepared to be armored, and the result was victory for him over the Spanish fleet, but how about his damage from the forts?"

A lieutenant who was seen tonight said he had received a letter from the Baltimore alone some 20 men were killed, and that this was a criterion of the effect of the battle on the rest of the fleet. He furthermore was of the opinion that this constituted the bulk of the crew of the Baltimore, as it is known here privately that she sailed from Hong Kong short-handed.

Another officer of experience admitted that he was not absolutely unadvised regarding the Manila engagement. He pointed out that Admiral Kinkaid's reticence was owing to the department's endeavor to secure the services of merchant and mail vessels for auxiliary cruisers. Said he: "When the true situation of things resulting from the fire on the ships and will in plain words frighten nine men out of ten from enlisting."

HIGH PRICES FOR GRAIN.

Vienna, May 5.—Owing to the great rise in the prices for corn, an agitation is on foot in the Reichsrath for the abolition of the corn duties.

SHIP ON FIRE.

Kobe, Japan, May 4.—The American four-masted ship May Flint, Capt. Nicholson, which arrived at Higo on May 1, from Philadelphia on Aug. 22, via New York, on Nov. 27, is on fire. It is hoped the vessel and the bulk of her cargo will be saved.

BREAD RIOTS.

Rome, May 5.—Bread riots have broken out at Modet, and several persons have been killed and 50 wounded. It is impossible to ascertain the exact number of the killed in the riots in the different provinces, but it is believed it reaches 50. Gen. Pelloux, minister of war, has permission to proclaim a state of siege. Forty thousand men have been called under arms today to reinforce the garrisons.

A LAMENTABLE CONFLICT.

London, May 4.—The Marquis of Salisbury, addressing the annual demonstration of the Primrose League (the great Conservative League of organization), at Albert Hall this afternoon, referred to the lamentable conflict proceeding between two powers, both friends of Great Britain, and expressed the hope that the experience of war and the recollection of the blessings of peace will be long bringing to the minds of both combatants sentiments which will restore tranquility to the world. (Cheers.)

MR. GLADSTONE'S CONDITION.

London, May 5.—The Daily Chronicle says this morning: "Mr. Gladstone's strength steadily declines, though there is, we believe, no prospect of an immediate end. The disease has not gained force enough to overcome the wonderful strength of his constitution, but a natural weakness has supervened, and he is now encouraged by Mr. Gladstone's fervent desire for the rest which he has so richly earned. He is now confined to his room. Now and again his mind reverts to critical periods in his career, and to the legislation which cost him the most anxiety, but the main thing that fills his thought is religion, and he speaks of death as his call."

AS A PRESENT.

President Dole Willing to Transfer the Hawaiian Islands to the United States.

Honolulu, April 27, via San Francisco, May 5.—President Dole has sent a long communication to President McKinley, offering to transfer the Hawaiian Islands to the United States for the purposes of his war with Spain, and to furnish the American ships of war in Pacific waters with large quantities of coal, supplies and ammunition. This action was taken by the executive after a secret conference of the Hawaiian cabinet.

Washington, May 5.—Senator Frye,

sneaking of the report from Honolulu, said that he hoped the president would accept the offer by President Dole. Members of the senate foreign committee on foreign relations generally interpret the report to indicate a willingness to form an alliance with this country for the war with Spain. They say that the action now taken will put the islands in the way of doing this country any favor possible.

Eleven Men Meet a Sad Fate.

Schooner Goes Down Off the Newfoundland Coast With All Hands.

St. Johns, Nfld., May 5.—The schooner Crown, Capt. Litchman, was lost off here yesterday, and her entire company, 11 men, all married, perished. The disaster has created intense sorrow here. The cause of the disaster is not known.

The sailing steamer Terra Nova has arrived here with 20,000 seals.

WESTERN ONTARIO

Guelph's rate of taxation is 24 mills. Mrs. (Dr.) Herod, of Guelph, died on Monday last after a week's illness. Harrow lost its fire engine, hose and cart by a fire in Wright's frame barn. Mrs. Fraser, of Detroit, was fined \$5 75 for riding on the sidewalks in Sandwich.

During April there were registered at St. Thomas 17 births, 11 marriages and 12 deaths. Charles Warwick is building an addition to his mill at Shaden, to be used as a pump factory.

The Tilsonburg factory began the manufacture of cheese on Monday, and large supplies of milk are coming in. The Lafarge Klondike party is reported to have broken up and some of the members have joined the Gauthier party.

Edward S. Singer, of St. Louis, was married Tuesday morning to Miss Annie Stewart, daughter of Robert Stewart, of Guelph.

A Romney correspondent announces the death on Tuesday of Mr. Peter Lawrence. The deceased leaves a widow and two daughters, Mrs. W. Morris and Miss Margaret.

A Vienna correspondent writes: After a steady go down for 30 years, our village in the price of all advances in pull-backs, has made a start this spring for a move up.

Mr. Silas Hemingway, of Springfield, had two valuable young cattle killed by the cars Saturday night. It is supposed that in rubbing against the gate they managed to force it open.

John Fraser, M. P., East Lambton, who has been absent from his parliamentary duties for the past two months on account of the serious illness of Mrs. Fraser, has returned to Ottawa.

David Brennan, a Chatham street seaman, was seized with dizziness on the street Wednesday, and fell heavily, striking his head violently and inflicting a gash from which the blood flowed freely. He was picked up unconscious and removed to his home.

The West Magdala school is closed this week on account of croup-diphtheria. Archie, the youngest son of Duncan Campbell, died on Friday night of croup-diphtheria. Quite a number of the young folks and children are laid up with sore throats and colds.

Mr. Hemingway, of con. 9, Springfield, has a very painful pain in his arm, and while making preparations for a concert attempted to clean her gloves with gasoline. The fluid caught in the result being that the lady was very badly burned.

Mr. Brasher reported to the town council that as the result of the visit of the deputations to the postmaster-general, at Ottawa, a closed bag service twice a day between Tilsonburg and Brantford was promised, and will be commenced as soon as arrangements can be completed.

John Leach, liverman, Elgin street, St. Thomas, was robbed of \$100 Tuesday night. Mr. Leach intended to go to Toronto next morning to buy a horse and harness. He put his money in an old box or trunk in his room at a stable. There was \$225 in all in two wads. He locked the door and placed a key on a chair. During the night someone took the key, unlocked the box, and stole \$100 of the money. The sum of \$90 was taken from a single pile and \$30 from the other. The robbery was undoubtedly committed by someone who knew where the money was, Daniel Hopper works for Mr. Leach, and with him Tuesday night. Hopper has been arrested by Chief Fawcetts and P. C. Armstrong on the charge of being the thief. Only \$2 30 was found on his person.
