## NEW TIME CARD ON L. AND P.S.R.

Six Trains Daily from London to Port Stanley and Return.

A new time card went into effect on the Pere Marquette this morning, by which six trains to and from Port Stanley are operated daily.

No. 41, for the Port, which formerly left at 5:40 a.m., now leaves at 5:45.

No. 1, for Walkerville, leaves at 6:50 instead of 6:45.

No. 43, for the Port, leaves as formerly at 9:45.

No. 45, is an extra train, and leaves at 1:20 p.m. for Port Stanley.

No. 47 leaves for the Port as usual at 2:30.

No. 3, for Walkerville, also leaves as formerly at 3:40 p.m.

No. 49 is an extra train, and leaves for the Port at 5:05 p.m.

No. 51, which formerly left London at 7 o'clock for St. Thomas, will now leave at 7:15, and will run through to the Port.

Returning trains will leave Port Stanley during the season at 7:45 a.m., 9:45 p.m., 3:45 p.m., 5:05 p.m., 6:05 p.m. and 11 p.m.

A special late train out of London for the Port has been asked for to accommodate the business men of London, and the matter is now being considered by the company.

Mr. E. W. G. Quantz Chosen to Succeed Mr. C. Gilmour—Dr. Daniel's Farewell.

Mr. E. W. G. Quantz at present organist at the New St. James' Presbyterian Church has been chosen as the new organist at the Askin Street Methodist Church to take the place of Mr. Gilmour, who leaves next Sunday.

Rev. Dean Davis announced yesterday that he had secured permission from the Bishop of Huron to shorten the services during the summer months.

Mr. Andrew, the new assistant at the Memorial Church, is to be tendered a social by the young people of that church this evening at 8 o'clock. All the members of the congregation are invited to attend and make the welcome a cordial one.

Dr. Daniel's Farewell.

Rev. Dr. Daniel, who is to take the pastorate of the Park Street Church in Chatham, preached his farewell sermon to the congregation of the Colborne Street Methodist Church last night. Dr. and Mrs. Daniel leave today for a trip to points east, prior to taking up their home in Chatham. At the close of last night's service, Dr. Daniel shook hands with many of his friends in this city, among whom he has been held in very high esteem. The Schubert Quartet rendered some excellent music at the service.

Rev. Mr. Stevenson, who has been preaching at St. Andrew's Church will give an illustrated lecture on "Work in the Canadian Northwest" on Wednesday evening.

The rector of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, Rev. W. T. Hill, was unable to preach at yesterday's services on account of illness. The pulpit was filled by Rev. Mr. Perdue, of St. Paul's Cathedral. Mr. Hill's condition is not serious.

Rev. Dr. Hannan occupied the pulpit of the First Methodist Church yesterday and delivered two excellent sermons. The new pastor, Rev. Dr. Routledge, of Chatham, is expected to assume his duties next Sunday.

Rev. Dr. Somerville, of Toronto, preached at both services in the First Presbyterian Church yesterday. In the morning his sermon was on home mission work. He called attention to the great needs of the Canadian West.

With 216,000 people added to its population in one year ending December 31. Most of these people, he said, were foreigners, and the great problem which confronts the country now is how to win these people over to be in sympathy with the Canadian form of government and thus become good citizens.

The best way of doing this, he said, was to preach the gospel to them and by educating their children. In closing he made a strong appeal to Presbyterians to leave their sons educated for missionary work, and to give liberally of their money.

A special feature of the service at Christ Church yesterday morning was the singing of a solo by Miss Corcoran while at the evening service Miss Gould sang very acceptably. The pastor presided at the morning service and in the evening exchanged pulpits with Rev. William Lowe, of St. Matthew's Church.

## WILL HOLD AN INQUEST

Coroner Decides to Investigate Death of Yardman Gould.

Certain statements made to Coroner McLaren regarding the death of Richard J. Gould, the Grand Trunk yard foreman, which was killed in the shops yards on Saturday morning, have caused the coroner to decide to hold an inquest.

The jury viewed the body this morning and then adjourned to allow for the collecting of evidence.

It appears that certain regulations of the company are being questioned by friends of the deceased, but there is no insinuation of foul play from any quarter.

TITUS RETIRES.

Princeton, N. J., June 22.—Constant T. Titus, national sculling champion, announced today his retirement from active rowing championships. He will still live in Princeton and coach Princeton University in aquatic sports on Lake Carnegie. It is understood that the recent rejection of Titus as an entrant by the English royal Henley regatta committee caused his withdrawal from the ranks of the scullers. He has won about all the championships possible in the United States. Titus rowed at Henley in 1902 and was beaten in the finals. His entries in 1903 and 1907 were rejected by the English committee for purely technical reasons.

## EXPRESS PLOWS INTO WORK TRAIN

Eight Italians Killed and 35 Injured in Connecticut Accident.

Hartford, Conn., June 22. — Eight Italian workmen were killed and 35 injured when a passenger train on the Highland division of the New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad ran into the rear end of a work train that was backing into the city from New Britain tonight, at Sigourney street crossing.

Of the injured two are not expected to recover.

Dead and dying were strewn along the track, while unfortunates, horribly mutilated, were beneath the wreckage, some pinned amid a mass of tangled iron and wood. Their groans and appeals for aid moved the rescuers to desperation and brave men worked till prostrated in an attempt to extricate the sufferers.

In one instance, it took an hour and a half to rescue one workman who was pinned between the trucks.

At St. Francis Hospital there were 21 victims tonight. The doctors say that two of them cannot live and they are unable to give any detailed information regarding the condition of the rest.

## VICTIM OF THE MASSACRE

Little Russian Hebrew Girl Dies in New York.

New York, June 23. — From injuries received in the cruel massacre at Kishineff, Russia, Louisa Pushinsky, 13 years old, died today in an ambulance while being taken from her home, 85 Columbia street, to Mount Sinai Hospital.

Dr. J. Rosenbluth, who had attended the child, certified that death resulted from an abscess of the brain, the result of an injury received in the Kishineff massacre two years ago. He also said that her body bore the marks of many wounds received on that terrible day, when blood ran in the streets of the Russian city.

Louisa and her parents lived in Kishineff two years or more ago. There she was a witness of the gruesome scenes of the awful days of the massacre.

Her parents escaped death almost by a miracle, and although fearfully slashed and left to die, were found unconscious among a heap of the dead and revived.

After order was restored in the city the girl's parents came to America. Her wounds gave her no rest, and a few days ago began to show alarming symptoms. It was hoped to save her life by removing her to Mount Sinai Hospital, but the excitement was too much for her.
