MUST TAKE MORE CARE IN HANDLING OF MILK

Board of Health Calls for Distinctive Marking of Bottles—Flamboro Licenses Cut Off

HAMILTON, July 27.—(Special.)—The board of health this evening decided to ask the city council to pass a bylaw making more stringent regulations with reference to the handling of milk. The bylaw will provide that the dealers must have a distinctive mark on the bottles, or whatever they use to deliver milk, and they will be held responsible for the condition of the milk delivered in the bottles bearing their mark.

The question of establishing an incinerator for the disposal of garbage will be taken up at a special meeting. The initial cost will be about \$30,000. Efforts have been made to have a clause inserted in the new street railway deal providing that the sanitary inspectors shall ride free, while in uniform. Dr. Roberts, the medical health officer, will represent the board at the Winnipeg meeting of the American Public Health Association.

Thos. McCauley of the Toronto West End Y.M.C.A. arrived here at 8.30 this evening on his long run to New York. He is carrying no baggage of any kind, and is clad only in a running suit. He expects that different Y.M.C.A. Associations on the route will feed and take care of him. He was well looked after to-night by Secretary T. F. Best and the members of the local Y.M.C.A. He took his time on the journey between Toronto and Hamilton, resting for three hours at a Y.M.C.A. on the way. He will start at 4 o'clock in the morning, and expects to be entertained by the Buffalo Y.M.C.A. Tuesday evening.

The North Westworth license commissioners have decided to cut off the licenses of the hotels at Bullocks and Clippings corners, leaving only two hotels in the Township of West Flamboro.

Conductor Killed. Walter Myers, a Radial conductor residing at 108 North Wellington-street, was killed at Burlington this morning while unloading wire. A bale weighing 800 pounds fell on him, breaking his neck and killing him almost instantly.

John W. Turner, the deserter from H. M. S. Albatross, was in Hamilton this morning, and was remanded until the authorities at Quebec take action.

M. J. McGavin will be appointed to institute state aid for the appointment of all the vacancies caused on the collegiate F. F. McPherson to a position on the normal school staff.

Murray J. Hill, the late J. D. Wilson, a medical student, died this morning at the residence of his mother, 38 Spruce-street.

FELT BROTHER DROWN. Twin Sister, Miles Away, Had Weird Apprehension of Danger.

ST. LOUIS, July 27.—While her twin brother Fred was being drawn to death in the quicksands of Long Lake, near Mitchell, Ill., yesterday, Merle Huber, 17 years old, who was twenty miles away, in Granite City, at home alone, shrieked and fell to the front porch in a faint. Neighbors ran to her assistance and revived her.

"Fred is dying. I can hear him calling to me. He is drowning. Let me go to him," moaned the girl.

Merle made frantic efforts to leave the house, but was held back by friends, who assured her that Fred was all right. The girl could not be quieted.

Five minutes later a message came from Mitchell that Fred had been drowned.

A freight train going west dropped one of its cars, the car plunging into the cutting, up the ties and loosening the rails.

As a consequence No. 94 will not arrive until 7 this morning.

DUTCH SEND WARSHIPS.

Will Protect Interests of Countrymen in Venezuela.

WILLEMSTAD, Island of Curacao, July 27.—The serious nature of the situation that has arisen between the Netherlands and Venezuela was emphasized to-day by the issuance of orders to the Dutch cruiser Gelderland to proceed at once to Venezuela to protect the Dutch interests there.

The Gelderland arrived here with M. De Reus, the Netherlands' minister consul at Curacao, on board. M. De Reus was dismissed from Venezuela by President Castro.

It was only a few hours after the cruiser's arrival that orders were received for an immediate return to Venezuela were received.

The departure of the Venezuelan vessel, Seno Lopez, has resulted in the cessation of the riots which grew out of the anti-Venezuelan sentiment here on Saturday and Sunday.
