LET THE FIRE BURN ON
TILL WOMEN WERE SAVEDNew York Fire Chief Uses Head
to Advantage in a Broadway
Blaze.

NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—There was a fire raging behind closed doors on the fifth floor of the twelve-story building, No. 65 Broadway, near Bond street, at 12:40 p.m. yesterday, when Battalion Chief Norton arrived there with two engines and one truck company.

The seven floors of the corkscrew skyscraper above the one where the fire was burning were crowded with women and girls. They were screaming like mad. Some were up on the roof, others crowded the fire escapes in the rear, facing Shubine alley, and there were still more in the side windows of the different floors overlooking the roofs of two adjoining buildings. No. 66 Broadway is five stories high and 654 is a seven-story structure.

Had Battalion Chief Norton allowed his men to start right in to fight the fire they would have had to smash down a door and let in air currents on the flames. This would have sent clouds of smoke pouring thru the building, doubly accentuating the wild panic of the frenzied women, many of whom were already on the verge of jumping from lofty heights. Instead, he ignored the fire and concentrated his men upon the job of getting the women out of the building.

At the head of his men, who were dragging the hose Norton worked his way up to the fifth floor and found the entrance door locked. A brawny fireman had raised an ax to shatter the door when Norton yelled:

"Don't hit that door. Let the fire burn. Get all these women out before you do anything else. Get them out."

The first batch of firemen went straight to the roof of No. 65 and drove the women down to the twelfth floor and into the elevators or the stairways. Other firemen kept on the fifth floor and the sixth to hustle the women who came down the stairways safely past the danger point on the fifth floor.

It took more than five minutes to clear the building. Twenty minutes later the fire was out.

GALT, Sept. 6.—(Special.)—The public school board has decided on the abolition of instruction in vocal music from the curriculum.

Singing has been taught successfully in the three schools for several years at a cost of \$300 a year, but the board has finally decided that the subject is an educational luxury and superfluous.

The penny savings bank, which Manager Jarvis of the Merchants Bank introduced in schools five years ago, is also threatened with abolition, a month's further trial being given it as a concession to the minority of trustees who favor it. The school principals were in consultation with the board and only one expressed himself as desirous of retaining the penny bank.
