Latest Style in Gloves.

decided quite early this season, as it was necessary for the buyers to get early importations in order to avoid the possible increase in duties, hence we can speak with authority as to colors as well as to lengths. The colors most sought for fall, aside from the certainty of blacks and whites, will be champagnes, oxblood, greens, blues, tans, reys and browns. There is an inreased interest this season in gloves of pique finish.
