



The Crime of Manslaughter.

"If he was in the possession of his faculties, he must be held to intend the natural result of what he did, but if he was so drunk that he did not know the natural result of what he did, the case is different. Then he is guilty of manslaughter only.

"The judge who presided at the first trial had not, it was considered, charged the jury fully on the law, and it was thought right to have a new trial. The law was fully explained to a second jury, who thought the culprit should be found guilty of manslaughter only.

"In another case a woman was charged with the murder of a child—the jury found her guilty of manslaughter. No one who did not hear all the evidence can say whether the jury were justified or not. If not, and the jury have allowed sentiment or sympathy to modify their verdict—and I do not suggest such is the case—that is a matter between them and their God which must be analyzed.


