PEOPLE MAKE THE LAWS JUDGES BUT ADMINISTER

Justice Riddell's Instructive Address at Ottawa on a Subject of General Interest.

OTTAWA, Jan. 18.—(Special).—The annual convention of the Eastern Ontario Live Stock and Poultry Association was opened to-night by Hon. Jas. Duff, minister of agriculture for Ontario. There was a large attendance. The chief address was given by Justice W. R. Riddell on "The Courts and the People."

"I have brought up on a Canadian farm, and associating all my life with Canadian farmers, I believe that I know these countrymen of mine. I know that I believe in them, and am proud of them; and I know that the more of other people and occupations, the more that pride is increased," said Justice Riddell, in prefacing his address.

"The civilization of the people depends largely upon the intelligence of the courts, and the courts, in turn, depend upon the intelligence of the people. The courts are the backbone of the state, and the people are the backbone of the courts."

"Our law consists largely of rules, which are the same as those which governed our ancestors," he said, referring to the duties of a court, and the power in themselves. "The law is not far distant."

"A court was an institution organized and conducted for the purpose of settling disputes, and the courts have been in existence since the first man was born."

"I am in the habit of saying to jurors that of the two highest rights possessed by a British subject, one is the right to select those who will make the laws for him, and the other to assist in the administration of the law. The latter is, to my mind, the more important and the more honorable. To ensure a verdict of a jury, every able-bodied man of the country may, if necessary, be called upon to serve on a jury. The duty of the jury is to take the law from the judge, whether they think the law wise and just or not."

Lecture Under Auspices of Engineering Society to Be Given by Inventor.

The lecture will be illustrated by use of drawings, showing the radical difference between Mr. Knight's invention and the valve type of motor heretofore used.

"In one case a man was charged with murdering his wife by beating her. He had been drinking, but at the trial no one thought that the law was an excuse for crime. If that were the law, it would indeed cause for alarm, but nothing can be further from the fact. This is what the court said: Where one man kills another, it is murder, if he intended to kill. And a man is held to have intended the natural consequence of his act, so that if he, without an actual intent to kill, does something which he ought to know he is doing which will result in the death of another, he is guilty of manslaughter."

"The crime of manslaughter. If a man is in the possession of his faculties, he must be held to intend the natural result of what he did, but he was so drunk that he did not know the natural result of what he did, the case is different. Then he is guilty of manslaughter only."

"The judge who presided at the first trial said that he considered the jury fully on the law, and it was thought right to have a second jury, who thought the culprit should be found guilty of manslaughter only."

"In another case a woman was charged with the murder of a child. The jury found her guilty of manslaughter. No one who did not hear the evidence could know to be guilty of manslaughter or not. If not, and the jury have allowed sentiment or sympathy to govern their verdict, I do not suggest such is the case—that is a matter between them and their consciences."

Miss Florence Keys Lectures to Women's Canadian Club.

Miss Florence V. Keys of Vassar College lectured to the members of the Women's Canadian Club on "Women in social service," yesterday afternoon.

Miss Keys, who is a sister of Professor David Keys of Toronto University, and a graduate of that institution, gave a most interesting address on the work performed by American women in social matters.

After referring to the good work done by Judge Lindsey in the children's court in Denver, she cited the case of a six-year-old boy in Louisville, Kentucky, who had been sentenced to 22 years for stealing a horse twice in seven hours. This outrageous sentence had resulted in the women of the city insisting that a juvenile court, similar to the Denver one, had been established.

Miss Keys gave an interesting sketch of the conditions prevailing in the shirt waist strike in New York, which she said had brought out the fact that more than anything else women must become voters.

BOTH NEGLIGENT
And Jury Awards Gilchrist \$1000 From Grand Trunk.

Both the plaintiff and the defendant company's counsel might have predicted the accident, was the verdict rendered by a jury in the jury assize court yesterday, but, nevertheless, the plaintiff was awarded \$1000 damages.

James Gilchrist sued the Grand Trunk for \$10,000 damages for the loss of a leg thru being struck by a train while in the performance of his duty. The accident occurred in July, 1907. He was walking along the track examining the rails when a train backing up struck him.

At a former trial Gilchrist got \$1500 damages, but the court of appeal ordered a new trial.
