RESERVILLE RACES.

Reserville, Mass., Aug. 22.—The outlook for victory of Ed Geers in the American Horse Breeders' Futurity stake for 1906, was bright and the arena of men charged with bookmaking or being present at the race, were all in a state of excitement. The stake event, the Norfolk for the 2.00 piece was won by Argol boy, who took three out of four races. The Norfolk for the three heats in the 2.12 trotting race without a hitch.

GEERS HAS WON BIG STAKE FOUR TIMES.

When Ed Geers won the Chamber of Commerce stake last week with Ardelle, reducing the record for the event to 2:05 1/4, he established a record such as to any one driver has ever held in relation to any one of the big fixtures of the horse turf, for it was the third consecutive time he had won the racing classic and the fourth time he had won it in five years. In 1902 Mr. Geers won it in the pacing stake, reducing the record for the event to 2:06 3/4.

The next season the record was not reduced, John Hussey winning the event with Elastic Pointer. In 1904 Mr. Geers won the event with Baron Granton, reducing the record to 2:06 1/4. In 1905 the Tennessee trainer again triumphed, winning with Walter Direct, a son of Direct Hal, his 1902 winner, and his best colt was dropped to 2:05 3/4. Last week with Ardelle Mr. Geers led his field home again and brought the record down to 2:05 1/4.

Each one of Mr. Geers' colts of stake winners has been a green pacer, and the fact that with his last two he has bested a 2:06 shows how fast the owner of a pacer will have to be prepared to go to justify entering him in the racing classic next year. Unless a pacer can pass the test of 2:10 there is absolutely no use in heading him for the slow classes in the grand circuit, nor unless he can pace 2:07 can his owner hope to win one of the big annual fixtures for slow class pacers.—Boston Herald.

DELMAR EAST AS EVER.

Major Delmar seems to be better than ever this season. At Cleveland the other day he trotted a mile in 2:07 and another in 2:10 3/4, coming the last half of the slower one in 0.59. What a wonderful trotter this gelded son of Delmar is, and what a pity it is that he is seen at all in public this year; it will probably be in instance events only.

INSTITUTE OF RADIOPATHY PROVED A VERITABLE MINE

In four months there poured into the office of "Prof." G. A. Mann, on the top floor of the Star Building, corner of Bay and Adelaide streets, from countries of Europe and from Mexico, the nest sum of \$304,084.53 as head of the "Institute of Radiopathy with a staff of eminent physicians."

This morning Guillaume A. Mann faced two charges in the police court. The first was vagrancy, to which he pleaded not guilty, and was remanded for a week on \$1,000 bail.

The second was a "posting for transmission and delivery letters and circulars to about schemes devised and intended to deceive and defraud the public."

A charge of vagrancy was at once registered against Mann, and he was allowed out on bail of \$1,000.

Most of the business was confined to European countries, and it is said to have consisted mainly in getting into a photograph. About 1,000 letters were stopped at the post offices by instructions from the police. The staff consisted of nearly twenty stenographers, clerks and translators.

A charge of vagrancy was at once registered against Mann, and he was allowed out on bail of \$1,000.

"Among his literature is some that is obscene and revolting."

One of the books seized by the Inspector, "The Brooks Library of Science," Rochester, which is supposed to have been run by Mann in the American city.

The letter heads represent the top of a beautiful turreted building among the trees, as it exists in Toronto.

"The secret of his success," remarked Sergeant Duncan, "is that he deals with people 3,000 miles away, and his charges are comparatively small — from \$10 to \$50."

"Another strong point in his system was that he cautioned each customer not to tell anyone about the photograph, or let him see it, or his friend would contact the very disease that he himself had."

The pills seized will number over one million, and the goods taken filled four wagons.

The local authorities are delayed in their investigations owing to the circulars in nearly every case being in French, German, Spanish and Italian. Now a search is being made for translators.
