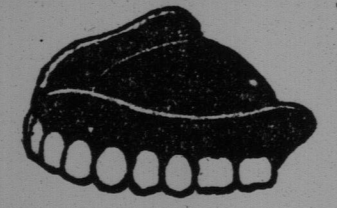

THE BAY SHORE The C. P. R. Spending \$35000 to \$40,000—Nearly 300 Men are at Work. Nearly three hundred men are now employed by the C. P. R. in making extensive improvements to the Bay Shore yards.

THE BAY SHORE (continued) A large steam shovel is employed in the work and rapid headway is being made. The total cost of the improvements now being carried out will mean an expenditure of about \$35,000 or \$40,000. It is expected that all will have been completed before the winter port trade opens up.

THE BAY SHORE (continued) The big new cold storage warehouse being erected by Parker & Co. of Toronto is about completed and the railway siding is being laid to it. The C. P. R. will have one of the finest railway yards in this section of the country when the work is completed, and they should be able to handle with despatch all freight sent through this port.

WHY PURCHASE THE BOTHFIELD? Mr. Mayes Claims it is a Wholly Unnecessary Expense for the City.

It was reported this morning that No. 2 crib site would be ready tomorrow. Engineer Scamwell said he had made up the soundings and found them very satisfactory, only a little clearing up being necessary. This he thought would be finished today and the site be in readiness tomorrow. The dredge will then be put at work on No. 3 site. Mr. Clark will probably make his soundings tomorrow or Wednesday, and if the result is satisfactory the crib will be placed in position on the next day.

In conversation with Mr. Mayes this morning he referred to the fact that according to the estimates there was about 8,500 yards of material to be dredged from the Sand Point berths to prepare them for the winter business. This material is very soft and easily dredged, and the Beaver could, it is claimed, remove from 1,100 to 1,200 yards a day. This would mean about six or eight days' work for the big mud-digger, providing there were no mishaps.

It is expected the Beaver can finish the work on No. 2 site today or tomorrow, only six or seven days would be necessary to prepare No. 3, and the Beaver could be put at this work, getting the berths cleared out in plenty of time.

Mr. Mayes thought it a needless expense for the city to buy a dredge like the Bothfield at a cost of upwards of \$30,000 for doing night or nine days' work at the Sand Point berths and a few days' work more at the Navy Island bar, after which it would be on the hands of the council with nothing to do.

After completing Nos. 2 and 3 sites the No. 4 site could wait for a few days, as Mr. Clark could go out with his work on Nos. 1 and 2, and in the meantime the Beaver could clean up the Sand Point berths by a going back to No. 4.

Mr. Mayes has six new spuds ordered for the Beaver, and is only awaiting cars for their delivery here. They are all in one chain, 80 feet long, and 37 1/2 inches square. They were made in British Columbia. This is the second lot Mr. Mayes has ordered since the dredge has been working here. The previous order was for five and they have all been placed in commission. Every time a spud is taken means a cost of about \$1,500.
