GERMANS THROW BURNING LIQUID ON THE ALLIES

Men in Trenches Seriously Burned But There is Quick Revenge

Paris, Feb. 27.—The war office this afternoon reported: "Our artillery in the Argonne exploded an ammunition depot near St. Hubert. In the wood near Melcourt between the Argonne and the Meuse the enemy again sprayed one of our advanced trenches with burning liquid, necessitating the abandonment of the trench, the occupants of which were seriously burned. A counter attack immediately checked the Germans, who suffered losses, including some prisoners. In the region of Verdun and on the heights of the Meuse our heavy artillery wrecked some German guns and exploded about twenty ammunition wagons, annihilated a detachment and destroyed an entire camp. In the Bois Brûlé the battle continues to our advantage."

THIRTY VESSELS HURL SHELLS AT TURKISH WORKS AT DARDANELLES

London, Feb. 27.—Serious damage has been inflicted upon the inner Turkish forts guarding the Dardanelles by the French and British warships, according to advices from Athens and Tenedos. Thirty men-of-war are hurling a tonnage of shells against the Turkish works, and the thunder of the guns can be heard at the island of Tenedos, thirty miles away.

Vice-Admiral Sackville H. Carden reports that the allied fleet has made steady progress in its attacks upon the forts, and that the work of reducing them is proceeding in a satisfactory manner.

Edgar K. Snowden, aged forty-five, died in Bangor as a result of injuries received from being struck by a train. He was a native of Wood Point, and formerly lived in Sackville.

ARE MAKING BREAD WITHOUT FLOUR NOW

Berne, Feb. 27.—Already as a result of a Franco-German conference held in Berne, the French government is to send trainloads of foodstuffs to Lille in charge of Swiss, who will be responsible for seeing that they really reach the French population, and are not consumed by the German army. An enterprising Berlin master baker has produced a special kind of war bread containing neither wheat nor rye flour, barley nor oatmeal as a change from "war bread." The people call it "mannes." The reason for one that it contains no ordinary flour and can be sold in restaurants without the production of customers' bread cards.

War cookery schools are now being opened throughout Germany. In Cologne there are twenty-four, where women are taught how to avoid all waste or extravagance.
