HORSE ARTILLERY IN ACTION SOON

Long Wait of Crack Canadian Battery About Over

QUERY IN COMMONS

Under Secretary of War Tennant Admitted Difficulty in Placing Them—Delay is no Reflection on Men

London, June 10.—R. P. Houston, Conservative member of Toxteth, addressed a series of questions to the under secretary of war in the house of commons regarding the alleged undue detention in England of the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery, under command of Colonel Fane, and upon the efficiency of the unit and its officers. Mr. Houston explained that Colonel Fane had had great difficulty in managing his men in consequence of their disappointment and keenness to go to the firing line, and in many cases they had deliberately absented themselves and stowed away to France with other units, only to be discovered and sent back to Marechal Camp.

Are you aware, asked Houston (1) whether the R. C. H. A. landed in England so far back as October 18, and are still at Marechal, although the other three of the four units comprising Brig. General Seely's column, the Canadian Dragoons, Strathcona's Horse and the 2nd King Edward's Horse have already been in the trenches; (2) whether the Canadian Horse forms part of the permanent force Canada and its commanding officer is one of the best and most efficient Canadian regular soldiers; (3) whether the government-general has assured the brigade before its departure that they would be utilised immediately; and (4) whether their detention was due to their being armed with the 13-pounder gun.

Mr. Tennant replied that the facts stated regarding the early part of the question are substantially accurate. He had no information as to what the Duke of Connaught told the battery before it left Canada. I have every reason to believe Colonel Fane to be a very capable officer.

It is true that the men are efficient and well trained with any particular gun can soon make themselves efficient with some other gun, but there is no justification for the suggestion that a slight is placed upon them by being retained in this country for military reasons. Some difficulty is found in placing and utilizing the battery which does not form part of a brigade, especially when it is armed with 13-pounder guns, but it is hoped that the occasion to utilize their services at the front may shortly occur.

NOTICE SERVED ON VALLEY RAILWAY COY

A meeting of the local government was held here yesterday, at which the matter of the Valley Railway was discussed. No action was taken with respect to the appointment of a new judge of probate and legation.

The matter of the Valley Railway was considered at some length. The government decided to request the St. John Quebec Railway Co. to file with the government such a proposition looking to the completion of the road, as is contemplated by an act passed at the last session of the legislature, bearing on the construction of the line. This would be done under section 4, which provides that in the event of the company failing, within such time as the lieutenant-governor-in-council may determine, to make arrangements satisfactory for the finishing of the road-work, the stock of the company may be taken over by the government.

This measure, the premier said, was merely preparatory to work being done upon the line was now in progress. The Intercolonial "Y" at Fredericton to Morrison's Mills, about a mile in length, and when this was completed, the present agitation in the matter would be at an end.

Regarding the matter of St. John connections, provision had been made some time ago, the premier said, as to the entrance of the Valley Railway to St. John, and in the face of this enactment, the present agitation in the matter seemed out of place.

MORNING NOTES OF THE WAR
Another German submarine has been sunk and its crew made captives. The steamers Mauretania and Transylvania, according to reports from Berlin, have arrived at Lennos, in the Aegean sea, with troops.

PRESBYTERIAN ASSEMBLY

Kingston, Ont., June 9.—Rev. Principal Forrest, of Halifax, presided in the moderator's chair at this morning's session. The publicity report was presented by Rev. J. H. Turnbull, Ottawa. He recommended that publications and business carried on by the Record and the Presbyterian publications committees be taken care of by one board, this board to care for the whole publishing interest of the church.

This brought up the question of changing the place of publication of the Record from Montreal to Toronto. Rev. Dr. Robt. Campbell, of Montreal, asserted that the assembly had the right to determine the policy to be followed.

The committee on traveling expenses, which had 492 commissioners of 288 entitled to a seat attended the last assembly. The expenditure was \$8,666. Many of the commissioners left for their homes today.




