JOHN L. IS SHUT OUT BY JEFFRIES

War Between the Two Former World's Champions
MOORE IS VICTOR

Little Fighter Knocks Out Broad of England in Third Round—Local and General Sporting News in Several Departments

(New York American).

Reno, Nev., June 23—John L. Sullivan, surmised the mighty, has been barred from Jeffries' training camp as a "knocker." The aged gladiator ambled into Reno this morning, and inside of three hours succeeded in stirring up one of the finest sporting scandals of late years, word of which is leaping all the telegraph wires, and is dividing Reno into hostile camps.

For the first time in a long and eventful life "young truly" always on the level" was today refused admission to the training quarters of a fighter, and informed that Jim Jeffries would not speak to him or take him by the hand. It was a tremendous body blow for the old war horse and a godsend to the correspondents.

John L. arrived on the morning train, fat, prosperous and important. His reverberating voice fairly jarred the windows as he passed along the main street, as the local papers truly remarked, "the cynosure of all eyes." He attracted as much attention as a military parade, the wide blades down the sides of his light trousers coming in for special mention.

Three hours after his triumphal entry into the theatre of war, John L. was on his way back to Reno from Moana Springs, where Jeffries is training. He was silent and very, very sore. The man who had shaken the hands of princes, potentates and Presidents, was told that he was a knocker, and as such would not be received.

Incidentally, Corbett, the "Richie" of diplomacy," paid off a thousand dollar score when, as spokesman for the Jeffries camp, he closed the gate under John L.'s brilliant white mustache and humiliated his old enemy before a crowd of witnesses, a platoon of war correspondents who were taking down every word, and a mosquito fleet of camera men who were recording every move and expression.

The feud between Sullivan and Jeffries dates back several months, when the Johnson match was made. At that time John L. asked for his opinion, was quoted with a line of inflammatory conversation which left undecided no person connected with the affair.

Naturally this displeased Jeffries, and he was still further angered at later interviews in which Sullivan was made to say that it will be a "money" fight.

The article which led to open war was one in which Sullivan's name was used in connection with a statement that the fight looked like a frame-up for Jeffries to win by Johnson quitting.
