WAS IN TROUBLE OFF COAST OF NOVA SCOTIA

Steamship H. J. Lawrence,
Bound Here, Diverted
to Halifax

The Halifax Chronicle says that the steamship H. J. Lawrence, bound from Cuba with a cargo of sugar, diverted from Saint John to Halifax, was drifting off the Nova Scotia coast, short of fuel, according to a wireless message received on Saturday morning from the vessel by W. S. Macdonald, Halifax agent for the ship. He got in touch with the tugboat Gontopolis, Captain Ormiston, of the Halifax Tugboat Company, and the tug was despatched to bring the steamer to port.

A radio received Sunday stated that the tug had arrived alongside the ship at 7:15 in the morning, and they were proceeding to Halifax. The Lawrence was then 80 miles south of Chelucto Head and it was expected that with good weather the tug and her tow would reach port early yesterday.

The H. J. Lawrence was almost into Saint John when she was diverted and her fuel supply enough to allow her to reach the New Brunswick port proved inadequate to take her to Halifax. She has a large cargo of sugar to be discharged at Woodside, Bellevue.

ANOTHER OLD-TIME SEWER COLLAPSES

They Are as Much Trouble as
Retaining Walls, Says
Commissioner

The collapse of another of the old wooden sewers was reported to Commissioner Wigmore this morning. The commissioner remarked that the wooden sewers were as much trouble to him as the retaining walls of the Commissioner of Public Works and that he could easily expend \$500,000 on renewing old sewers.

The sewer which was reported this morning runs under some houses from Mecklenburg to Queen streets and the collapse occurred at the corner of Queen and Westworth streets. It is marked on the city plan as having been abandoned but some of the houses in that vicinity still use it. A crew of men are busy digging down and a renewal will be made with 12 or 15 inch terra cotta pipe.

FIREMEN INJURED IN NEWBURGH FIRE

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Jan. 11.—More than a score of firemen were injured, three seriously, 16 families made homeless on one of the coldest nights of the winter, and nine buildings destroyed, when fire swept through the heart of the business district early today. The damage is estimated at \$300,000.

The buildings destroyed included one six story structure, six of four stories and two of two floors. All were of brick. Three firemen were treated to a hospital suffering from cold and exposure. More than a score were treated for injuries received from flying glass and debris.

WANT CURB PLACED ON SENATE VETO

OTTAWA, Jan. 11.—That the British North America Act should be amended so as to restrict the powers of the Senate to veto a bill passed by the House of Commons more than twice, was urged upon the government today by representatives of the four International Railway Brotherhoods. Further restriction of Asiatic immigration, reintroduction of the old age pension legislation defeated last year in the Senate, and amendments to the criminal code, were among other suggestions made.

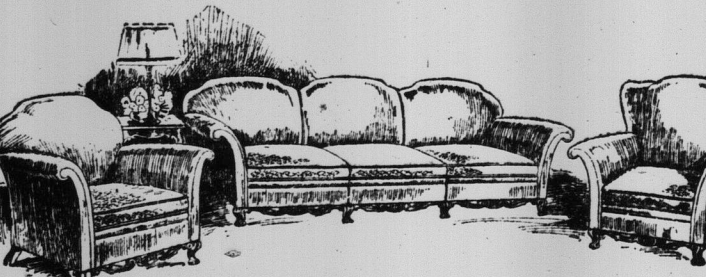
Representatives of the Railway Brotherhoods met Premier King and members of the cabinet shortly after noon today.

of San Luis Potosi, Bishop Nicolas Corona of Papanita, and Bishop Ignacio Valdespino Y. Diaz of Aguascalientes were also arrested.

The aged Archbishop Mons. Del Rio, head of the hierarchy in Mexico, was led from the episcopal building soon after his arrest and word was later received that he would be expelled from the country. He sent to his home for some personal belongings. Government officials refuse to give any information as to his whereabouts, but it is thought he is en route to the port of Vera Cruz under military guard.

ONLY ONE FREE.

The five prelates taken with Bishop Doan are held without specified charges. In the writing, the only Catholic prelate in the capital at liberty is the aged Archbishop Mons. Del Rio, head of the hierarchy in Mexico. The episcopal building is under military and police guard.

Troop movements under the direction of the war department, continue. Most of the details are kept secret, but it is known that strong reinforcements are being sent to the northern states.

Every railroad train in the republic carries a heavy military guard. However, the burning of bridges and disruption of traffic by outlaws, some of whom call themselves revolutionists, continue.

MAYOR KILLED

The mayor of Cocula and the local deputy, Soteres Castillo, were among those killed. The dispatches, which were lacking in details, reported that the municipal authorities offered resistance to a religious demonstration, whereupon the Catholics attacked the municipal officials, employees and policemen, a battle ensuing.

It was announced today, have decided to support President, Calles, and Mexico City headquarters has instructed all agrarian organizations throughout Mexico to co-operate with Federal troops in pursuit of rebels wherever found.

Homeless Filipinos Fed By Red Cross

MANILA, Jan. 11.—One thousand Filipinos whose thatched homes were burned in a fire that destroyed four blocks of buildings in the Tondo district of Manila, were fed last night by the Red Cross. Four hundred houses of the poor were burned and 3,200 made homeless. Two hundred soldiers aided the Manila fire department fighting the flames.

Home Television Is Coming Soon

NEW YORK, Jan. 11.—The time is not far distant when family groups may remain by the fireside and see events in any part of the world being depicted simultaneously with their occurrence, members of the Institute of Radio Engineers, assembled in convention were told yesterday.
