EDMUNDSTON RACING DATES TRANSFERRED TO WOODSTOCK

50,000 Are Expected To Witness \$75,000 Hambletonian Stake This Year

THREE CLUBS BACK OF MEET FOR AUG. 17-18

Board of Stewards of Maine and N. B. Circuit Hold Special Meeting

FREDERICTON, N. B., July 28.—The board of stewards of the Maine and New Brunswick racing circuit at a special meeting here last evening approved a proposal for the transfer of the allotment of the dates of the week of August 16th from Edmundston, N. B., to Woodstock, N. B.

The Woodstock Driving Club and the Progressive Club of Houlton, have joined in a co-operative proposal to put on a meeting at Woodstock that week to keep the circuit campaigners racing and tonight the representatives of the Fredericton Driving and Sport Club offered to put their organization back of the project, too. The three clubs—Woodstock, Houlton and Fredericton—will therefore put on the meet under their joint auspices probably on August 17th and 18th.

PREPARE FOR NEXT YEAR

The board of stewards also decided to take early action towards preparations for the 1927 season and another meeting will be held here in September during the Fredericton 1926 exhibition when dates will be arranged and preliminary arrangements made for next year's racing. It is proposed to line up the fall fair racing as well as the summer racing under the circuit control, the expectation being that there will be a solid season's racing from the first of July until October. The usual mid-winter annual meeting of the circuit will be held in February.

President F. O. Creighton, of Woodstock, presided at the meeting of the board of stewards, with J. B. Black, Fredericton, as secretary. The stewards present were: Presque Isle, Ralph Carey; Edmundston, F. D. Tweedie; Woodstock, J. H. Dewitt; Moncton, P. A. Bellevue; St. Stephen, R. M. Webster; Houlton, Lee W. Zeller; Carleton Place, Murray D. Briggs, and Fredericton, T. V. Monahan.

LADIES MEET TO BE HELD ON AUG. 14

Women's Canadian Track Championship to be Staged at Toronto Stadium

The first annual ladies' Dominion of Canada championship track and field meet will be held at the University of Toronto stadium, Toronto, under the auspices of the Toronto Ladies' Athletic Club, on Aug. 14, according to a letter received yesterday by Miss Mary Belding, president of the Maritime branch of the Women's Amateur Athletic Federation of Canada, from the secretary of the Toronto club. Entries close on Aug. 7 with Miss Hazel Rutter, secretary of the championships committee, 182 Seaton street, Toronto.

The sanction for holding the meet has been granted by the Toronto club by the W. A. A. F. of C. The meet is open to all athletes registered with the W. A. A. F. and the rules of the A. A. U. of C. will govern all events. Gold, silver and bronze medals will be awarded to those coming first, second and third respectively, in the various events.

An entry fee of 25 cents for each event will be charged. Teams entering relay races will be asked to pay \$1 fee. As this is the first meet of its kind to be held, all times made in the races and distances in the jumps and other events will be Dominion records.

Five Heats Needed To Decide Winner of Race at Fredericton

Lambert Todd Takes Junior Free-for-All, Red Line Wins 2.13 Mixed, and Peter Will Tell the 2.20 Trot—Drivers Fined for Not Trying.

FREDERICTON, July 28.—The first day of Fredericton's mid-summer harness race meet passed off with two races being settled in straight heats, and in the third five heats were required to decide, with the last heat the fastest of the class, after two drivers had been fined at the end of the fourth heat. Red Line, a Woodstock horse, won the 2.13 mixed class, and the Junior Free-for-All went to the veteran Lambert Todd, of the Utton stable from Vermont. It was the slow class of the card, the 2.20 trot, which furnished the discipline and the fast fifth heat.

In the 2.20 Gwendolyn Aubrey won the first heat in 2:14. This mare was favored by many to win the race, but in the second heat she faltered only three laps, Katherine Clark, a Vermont entry, taking the heat. The third heat went to Peter Will Tell, in time equal to the first heat. The splitting of the heats made the race drag a bit, and it was late in the afternoon when the four horses standing for the money scored for the word. This heat was so unsatisfactory to the spectators that they yelled for John Willard to be taken down from behind Gwendolyn Aubrey. The latter mare finished fourth in a heat which had the slow time of 2:17. Driver Utton with Katherine Clark was third. Both horses were away back. When the announcement of the heat was made from the stand it was announced that fines of ten dollars had been imposed on Willard and Utton for not driving to win.

At the start of the fifth heat the three drivers were called to the wire, where they were told that the heat must be a race or the drivers could take the consequence. The three heat winners took the word. Willard stuck close to Peter Will Tell for the first half and took the lead from him in the second, winning in a good finish. The time of 2:13.4 showed that the caution of the officials had effect. Gwendolyn Aubrey by winning the last heat took second money, Peter Will Tell standing better in the summer and winning the race. He also took the mark of 2:14.

FAST TIME MADE BY PETER MALTBY

Harriman Horse Makes New World Circuit Record at Grand Circuit Meet

ENDICOTT, N. Y., July 28.—Last year's two-year-old champion, Peter Maltby, Harriman stable at Goshen, winning the three-year-old trot in straight heats at the Grand Circuit meeting thrilled more than 20,000 light harness racing devotees by establishing a world's colt record for a half-mile track in the race's second and final heat, which he did in 2:09.

Haligonian Is Designer Of The Winning Yacht Acadia

W. J. Rouse, Who Drew the Plans of Famous Fishing Schooner Bluenose, is Successful in First Attempt to Design Racing Yachts—Built at Baddeck

HALIFAX, July 28.—The "R" sloop Acadia, which won the first race of the George Cup series of Watertown, N. Y., today, represents the first serious attempt of W. J. Rouse, Halifax designer of the renowned fishing schooner Bluenose, to create a racing yacht. He has planned many cruising yachts, but Acadia is the first he has designed with speed as the chief aim. Rouse drew the plans for Acadia in the autumn of 1925 and she was built at Baddeck, N. S., last winter by F. W. Baldwin, well-known Cape Breton yachtsman, on order of Commodore George H. Gooderham, of the Royal Canadian Yacht Club, Toronto.

GRAND CIRCUIT FEATURE TO BE HELD ON AUG. 30

Cream of Three-Year-Old Trotters Will Meet at N. Y. State Fair at Syracuse

THE big harness horse race of the year, the Hambletonian Stake for 3-year-old trotters, purse \$75,000, will be raced at the Grand Circuit meeting in connection with the 86th New York State Fair in Syracuse, Aug. 30.

There is intense interest in this race all over the East and indications are that it will be witnessed by over 50,000 people.

Many of the colts entered in the Hambletonian are racing weekly in the Grand Circuit and there has been such a change in form in these horses weekly that turf experts are unwilling to venture a prediction as to which one will be best at Syracuse. It looks now as though the race will be one of the most closely contested in the history of the harness horse.




