

Sir George spoke of 25,000,000 acres of good land in the prairie provinces alone; of nearly 6,000 unoccupied improved farms in Ontario, and of the more or less demand for population in other provinces. He felt all would agree that the most pressing immediate need was for good agricultural settlers, because agricultural development was the basis of all timber, minerals and other resources was also being retarded by lack of man power. There was no real reason, in the speaker's opinion, why the population wanted in Canada should not pour into the country if Canadians only did their part. Closely and dispassionately the whole question of immigration should be examined, and decision arrived at as to what restrictions and regulations should be retained and which should go. While Canadians should be willing to profit by the experiences of others, regulations adopted in the United-States should not unduly influence this country. The conditions were different, and Canadians should study the immigration question as their own peculiar problem. But if something were not done in this matter of immigration, the speaker could not say how Canada was to save herself under increasing burdens.


