Says Beckett Can Go On.		
London, June 20.—An operation was performed last evening on the injured hand of Joe Beckett, English heavy-weight, who is under contract to fight Georges Carpentier on July 4. After the operation the surgeon said Beckett's hand should be well in a few days. If it was not important for Beckett to fulfill his engagement for July 4, he would advise only gentle exercise for the next few weeks, but Beckett would run no risk by beginning training soon and fulfilling the engagement.

Action at Ottawa.		
Ottawa, June 20.—(Canadian Press)—On a tie vote the amendment to the Criminal code to prohibit the publication of racing information except at race tracks was defeated yesterday in the Senate committee which had the criminal code amendment bill in hand. Senators McMeans and McLennan supported the section, while Senators Fowler and Barnard voted against it. Sir James Loughheed and Senator Belcourt refrained from voting. As the vote was a tie, Senator Pardee, who was in the chair, ruled that the clause was lost. On the proposal of Chairman Pardee, it was decided to have the law officers draft a section to prohibit the circulation of racing forms. They are now barred from the mails but come in by express.
