AWARD OF V. O. N.
SCHOLARSHIPS

Thirty-one Announced—Hon. W. F. Roberts at the Meeting.

Ottawa, Oct. 21.—At the executive council of the Victorian Order of Nurses for Canada today the award of thirty-one scholarships each amounting to \$400 to nurses in the form of post graduate public health courses in five Canadian universities was awarded.

Dr. Thomas Gibson presided, and in addition to the council, Dr. Malcolm T. Macleach, superintendent of the Vancouver General Hospital, and Hon. Wm. F. Roberts, M. D., Minister of Health for New Brunswick, sat in an advisory capacity.

A nursing council, to be a sub-committee of the executive and to consist of five members of the executive council and the chief superintendent was appointed. The executive members are Mrs. R. W. Reford, Miss Muriel Galt, Montreal; Dr. Harley, Toronto; C. A. Magrath and Mrs. J. B. Fraser, Ottawa. Among the nurses taking their scholarship courses is Lenora V. Jackson, R. N., at Dalhousie University.

THRILLING TIME
WITH ELEPHANT

British Big Game Hunter Has an Exciting Few Minutes With Infuriated Bull.

London, Oct. 2.—A good elephant hunt is told by J. Morewood Dowsett, a well-known big game hunter, who has just returned from a hunting trip in South Africa.

He was hunting elephants in Uganda when information was brought him of the whereabouts of a large herd. With a native chief and a house boy, he started to find them.

The party came upon the herd in the forest. Mr. Dowsett got several photographs within twenty yards of the beasts when the chief warned him that they had been "scented" and that the animals were coming for them. Snatching up his rifle Mr. Dowsett shot and killed the leader, a big bull.

While some surrounded their dead leader, many of the beasts stampeded and, running the wrong way, Mr. Dowsett was cut off from the party. Reaching his gun, the hunter dashed off for safety and ran into a big bull elephant which charged through the bush six yards in front of him.

"Trunk aloft, ears extended and trumpeting wildly, the beast rushed at Mr. Dowsett and swept him to the ground with his trunk and turned rapidly in its own length ready to trample him."

The hunter took a flying dive under the monster's belly, realizing he would then be on the light side of the wind but the beast turned rapidly round and again tried to trample him. Instead the animal rolled him over and over with its legs and the hunter saw above him two great tusks as the beast tried to pick him up. Mr. Dowsett managed to roll behind the animal and get to his feet and make a run for cover.

To the hunter's relief and surprise the furious beast set off in the opposite direction and disappeared.



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THE MARITIME
WATER POWERS

K. H. Smith Tells Engineers of Possibilities in the Lower Provinces.

He said that \$600,000 horse power for commercial purposes could be developed and showed a series of slides, indicating what had been done in other places, to establish the practicability of such a plan in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. There were many fine possibilities for the development of water power, he said.

In view of all this potential electrical energy which could be developed in the parts of the provinces might be incorporated into an inter-connecting transmission system supplying power to all parts of the maritime provinces and electrifying some part of the maritime railways.

At the conclusion of Mr. Smith's address a vote of thanks, moved by C. C. Kirby and seconded by H. F. Bennett was tendered him by the chairman. An informal discussion of the Musquash development also took place.

200 WOMEN PATIENTS
