

## STABBED BY FATHER, DYING BOY DENIES

Fell on Knife Accidentally,  
Insists Son, But Parent  
Admits Guilt—Struck Him  
Down in Quarrel, He Says.

Though dying of a stab wound which his father admitted inflicting in a quarrel, James Joyce, 19-year-old son of a City Island, N. Y., refreshment stand owner, steadfastly pretended in the face of persistent police questioning that the wound resulted from an accidental fall while he was carrying a bread knife and that the father, John Joyce, was blameless.

The elder Joyce has a stand at City Island avenue and East Short road, N. Y. Island, and James has been helping him run it. A telephone message was received by the police of the City Island station that "a young man has been stabbed at Joyce's stand." Dr. Levine of Fordham Hospital, who was called by the police, found James Joyce back of the counter, bleeding from a wound in his right breast.

Dr. Levine rushed the wounded man to Fordham Hospital, where it was found that the knife had pierced his lung and that his condition was critical. Young Joyce told his questioners that he had been helping his father at the stand and had picked up a large bread knife and was carrying it when he fell, with his point toward his breast.

Detectives Reilly and Rice of the Westchester station brought the father to the hospital. When the detectives and District Attorney Edward Glennon questioned him he declared that he had stabbed his son in a quarrel. He said James was helping him open the stand yesterday and that he brought up question of living some one to help him. He said that when he suggested the name of a man James protested, angry words followed and, according to him, the son made a movement as to strike him. Thereupon, said the father, he picked up the knife and struck his son in the breast.

James Joyce leaped into unconsciousness early last evening, asserting that he had fallen on the knife and declaring that his father's version of the stabbing was untrue.

### RECENT DEATHS

Rev. Edward Henry Ball, D.C.L., Chester, N. S., April 11—Rev. Edward Henry Ball, D. C. L., aged seventy-nine, one of the oldest Anglican clergymen in the diocese of Nova Scotia, died here this morning. His ministries in various parishes of the provinces, including Mulgrave, Westville and Baddeck, covered fifty-five years.

Lyman Holden. Lyman Holden, one of the famous "Lascalle Bros.," died in the Municipal Hospital, East St. John, yesterday. Holden and his partner, F. F. Proctor, who is now a millionaire theatre owner of New York, were leaders in trapeze stunts in the circus world, and travelled practically all over the world. The late performer came here when his career was cut off by an injury. For years he did odd jobs, and then his wife went back to the states and he retired to the institution, where he died yesterday, at the age of seventy-two years.

Miss Gertrude Thomson. The death of Miss Gertrude E. Thomson occurred yesterday at her home in Moncton, of heart failure. She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Elias Edwards, with whom she resided.

Charles McLeod. Charles McLeod died at his home in Montreal yesterday. He was one of the oldest and best known life underwriters in the maritime provinces. He was sixty-seven years of age and was born in Prince Edward Island.

Mrs. Patrick Walsh. The death of Mrs. Patrick Walsh took place at Roxbury, Mass., on Saturday morning. She was a daughter of the late Patrick and Rosanna McGinn, well known in this city. She leaves her husband and one daughter, Laura, to mourn.

Clarence A. Harrison. In the death yesterday of Clarence Aubrey Harrison, aged eighteen years, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph A. Harrison, of Gondola Point, Kings county, (N. B.) lost their only son. He is survived by four sisters, Grace, Agnes, Edith and Jean. The young man's death occurred suddenly and his relatives are grief-stricken over their loss. The funeral will be held on Friday afternoon at two o'clock.

## WILD PISTOL SHOTS LAND 3 IN CELLS

One Prisoner Calls Six Discharges Accidental—Others Blame Angry Husband.

(New York Times.) Wild pistol firing for trivial reasons or no reason were reported yesterday. Manuel Compudoni, a Porto Rican who said he was a printer, was held in bail of \$3,000 by Magistrate Corrigan for having fired six shots with an automatic pistol into the floor of his room. Compudoni said it was an accident, but was unable to account satisfactorily for so many shots.

Two men sleeping below Compudoni in his lodging house were suddenly roused shortly after midnight by the burst of firing overhead. Bullets peppered the pillow on which they were sleeping and shattered them with splinters from the ceiling, which was punctured by six holes. After great excitement in the house, Compudoni was arrested by policemen who told him that his explanation of the shooting as an accident in six acts was unique in their experience. He had no license for the pistol and was locked up under the Sullivan law.

Louis Loversy, of 838 East Eighty-first street, and Joseph Gans of 119 East 127th street, were arrested yesterday after a round of dancing in a cafe at 119 East 127th street had been interrupted by a shower of pistol bullets. Loversy, it was said, had been mistaken for a "wife pirate."

Gans and Loversy alleged the bullets were fired at them, not by them, but they were fined \$5 each on charges of disorderly conduct by Magistrate Joseph Corrigan in Harlem Court. Loversy said that, merely intending to be polite, he asked another man's wife to dance. Her husband, Loversy declared, drew a pistol and fired repeatedly. Most of the guests disappeared and the husband went uncaught.

### PARENTS GOT DAMAGES.

Pre-natal Shock Caused Mental Deficiency in Child.

(Special Cable to The New York Times and Montreal Gazette.) Paris, April 9.—A case of interest to kindly intentioned automobilists as well as students of pre-natal influence has just been decided here by the Court of Appeals.

On an evening last summer Monsieur Parizot took his friends, Monsieur and Madame Goubier, for a ride in his automobile. They were by Parizot until his car was wrecked. Then the thoughtless changed to enmity. Some time later when a child was born to the Goubiers it showed signs of mental deficiency. A suit was immediately started against Parizot but was dismissed by a lower court. When the suit was appealed experts were brought in to testify to the effect of a pre-natal shock on an infant's mentality, and the decision of the lower court was reversed. Parizot was ordered to pay 20,000 francs damages.

### WIFE KILLS HUSBAND IN HIS RESTAURANT

She Shoots Him From Behind as He Replies at Telephone in Toledo Eating Place.

Toledo, Ohio, April 12.—John H. Tepper, aged 35, proprietor of three Toledo restaurants and one in Indianapolis, was shot and fatally wounded by his wife. The women was in one of Tepper's eating places, which was filled with diners. She fired one shot and walked out. She was arrested shortly afterward.

Tepper and his wife had been separated for more than a year, following the filing of divorce proceedings by Mrs. Tepper, in which she mentioned another woman. According to the police, Tepper was seated at a table with a woman companion, and Mrs. Tepper and another woman were at a nearby table. Tepper left his seat to answer the telephone, the police say, when his wife stepped behind him and fired a revolver. The bullet lodged near Tepper's heart and he died shortly after arriving at a hospital.

Tepper's companion was later arrested. The marriage of Tepper and the woman who shot him was said by the police to have been the culmination of a romance which began when Tepper was employed as a waiter and the wife as a waitress.

Child Shoots Mother by Accident. Mrs. Marie Pellissio, 44, the mother of nine children, was accidentally shot in the breast by her daughter, Nancy, 13, in the kitchen of their home at 2,622 West Sixteenth street, Brooklyn. The mother was taken to Coney Island Hospital, where it is said she may die. The girl found the pistol in a chicken coop in the back yard. She showed it to her mother and, thinking it unloaded, pulled the trigger. Tony, 9, threw the pistol into Coney Island Creek near by.
