Jews Raising Fund of \$125,000,000 to Provide for Development.

London, Jan. 6.—(Associatted Press, By Mail).—Jews throughout the world were asked to consent to a form of self-taxation by tithes in the manifesto recently issued by the Palestine Foundation Fund, asking for \$125,000,000 for manifesto was signed by a number of distinguished Jews, including Lord Rothschild, Sir Alfred Mond and Dr. Chaim Weizmann.

The manifesto outlines a big program of irrigation, drainage, forestry, roadmaking, bridge building and town planning which it says can be accomplished if the Jews of the world will tax themselves to produce the fund desired. It adds that the purpose of the promoters is to enable immigration into Palestine to begin without delay and to provide for the economic development of the country. Thousands are waiting on the threshold of Palestine, it asserts.




