TURF.

A Big Day.

Lexington, Ky., Oct. 4.—One of the largest crowds that ever attended a Grand Circuit meeting here is gathered for the opening of the trotting season. The fields are large and in most events evenly balanced. There are thirteen races each in the Walnut Hall Cup and 2.07 pace. Twenty were named in the 2.12 trot and the field was split, with ten in each event for \$1,000, while there are seven in the two-year old division of the Kentucky Futurity.

Man-o-War to Retire.

New York, Oct. 4.—Man-o-War, champion American race horse, will be retired from the track after his match with Sir Barton at Windsor, Ont., on Oct. 12. Samuel D. Riddle, owner of the animal, announced yesterday. Mr. Riddle said that it would be of greater benefit to the turf to have the horse reserved for breeding purposes than to continue to demonstrate his racing ability.

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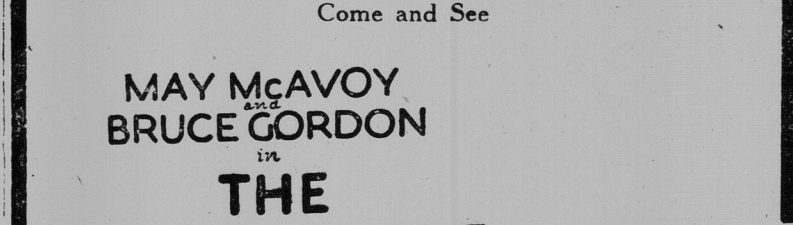
