### HIS ONLY REQUEST WAS FOR A GRAVE

Man in Detroit Jumps Eleven Stories From Hotel Window—All Bones Broken.

Detroit, March 12.—Leaving an open Bible on his dresser, with the 23rd chapter of Genesis marked, Charles J. Rogers, thirty-three, a resident of St. Louis, was instantly killed when he leaped from the eleventh story window of Hotel Tullier to the pavement.

The body was found by a patrolman on the sidewalk on the Adams avenue side of the hotel. Rogers had landed with such terrific force that both legs and most of the bones in the lower part of his body had been shattered.

The chapter marked in Rogers' Bible, and reading, "I am a stranger and a sojourner with you; give me possession of a burying place with you, that I may bury my dead out of my sight," gives only a dim light on the tragic death. The entire chapter deals with the death and burial of Sarah, wife of Abraham.

The dead man had been a claim adjuster for the Federal Casualty Company of St. Louis. His visit to Detroit was supposed to have been in connection with some personal litigation.

### C. P. R. EQUIPMENT ORDERS TOTAL FIFTEEN MILLIONS

Montreal, March 12.—The C. P. R. has given out equipment orders totalling roughly \$15,000,000.

These orders will call for: Freight equipment—2,500 sixty-ton box cars, 400 refrigerator cars, 500 automobile cars, sixty-seven ore cars.

Passenger equipment—twelve dining cars, fifty-three sleepers, thirteen compartment cars, twenty-four baggage cars. The company will be able to execute a considerable portion of the orders, while the Canadian Car and Foundry Company, Ltd., will get a large part of the total.

### "PUSSY FOOT" JOHNSON RESTING IN ALGERIA

Attleboro, Mass., March 11.—"Pussy Foot" Johnson, who conducted the campaign against liquor here in 1910, has been written to by John M. Fisher, former prohibition candidate for governor, and discloses the fact that Mr. Johnson is now recuperating in Algeria.

"Your last two letters overtook me down here yesterday," he writes. "Letters addressed to me in all sorts of ways have been reaching me. One postal card from America simply addressed 'Pussy-foot Johnson, Somewhere in England,' came all right. In an attempt to get where I could pull myself together again, I am here in a sort of a capital of the Sahara Desert, more than 400 miles southeast of Algiers, and intend to stay down this way until toward April 1, when I will go back to England hunting more trouble, and will probably find it."

"One eye is gone, but the other is coming out all right, and I am almost as good as new. I am not grieving at all about the eye business, it was a god's investment, the way the thing turned out. So many good men have given up their lives for this cause, that I regard this contribution of one eye as a very small matter, comparatively speaking. I am indeed glad of the opportunity."

"It is a wonderful country down here, a few French, one of whom runs a good hotel. A few tourists get down this way. The balance is made up of Arabs, Senegalese, Boudouins, Kabyles, Senegal negroes and the Lord knows what all. I am gaining strength every day, and will be myself in a few weeks again. That was a noble thing in your making the use of the sanatorium, that you did. Life counts in accomplishments and not by years, and John M. Fisher's gifts will continue to do good long after you are dead. Remember that."

### ABOLISH PADDLES ALSO FLOGGING

But Jap Police Still Torture Korean Suspects—Pepper Tea Ineffective.

London, March 12.—"The efforts of the new Japanese administration of Korea to recover the confidence of the Korean people are largely nullified by official mistreatment of Koreans," says the Tokio correspondent of the Daily Express.

"While the use of paddles and flogging is publicly abolished by the government, police officers regularly use torture upon the suspects."

The following particulars of the methods employed are furnished by Dr. Frank Schofield of the Severance Mission Hospital, Seoul:

"Case 1.—An educated young man, punished with ninety blows of the paddle for complicity in the independence movement, and released after six weeks' imprisonment, was re-arrested and questioned with regard to the bomb that was thrown at Admiral Saito. During the police examination he was seven times suspended from the ceiling by a cord tied around his wrists; on live occasions his head was forced back and tied to his hands, which had been fastened behind his back; water was poured down his nostrils off and on during a period of four days, and for a further period three days soap and water were substituted for plain water."

"As a last expedient in this line, pepper tea was used; the reaction was so severe that the young man became unconscious. All these methods having failed, the police ordered his toe nails to be extracted. "Case 2.—A young man charged with printing the 'Independence' newspaper, refused to give the names of his accomplices. He was beaten unconscious three times in six days and once by hot irons. When seen by the doctors he was a physical wreck."

"Case 3.—A Korean young woman, over the head that an abscess formed in on ear, and her knee and hip joints were twisted to the verge of dislocation. She was 'thoroughly spat upon.'"

"One result of such methods is naturally the production of false evidence and the prosecution of innocent people. Another is the creation of a conviction in the Korean mind that promises of reform are for foreign consumption only, and that there is no hope of their condition being ameliorated under Japanese rule. Such are the evil results of ten years of military rule."

### TWENTY CENTS A MONTH TO REMAIN UNMARRIED.

Youngstown, Ohio, March 12.—It will cost the men of this city twenty cents a month to remain unmarried if a measure, now before the city council, goes through. It places a tax of that amount on all bachelors who now pay no municipal taxes.

### GUN FIGHT WITH FIVE BANDITS AT CANTON, OHIO.

Canton, Ohio, March 12.—Three men were wounded in an exchange of shots when five automobile bandits held up a restaurant here and escaped with \$5,000 in cash. A waiter who tried to defend the cafe was badly wounded.

Montreal, March 11.—The council of the Board of Trade yesterday afternoon passed unanimously a strong resolution for the local adoption of daylight saving. This action places them in line with the city administrative commission and the city council.

### 100 YEAR OLD FEUD DUE TO DOG BITE

Vendetta Between Egyptian Villages Ends With Trial of 75 Persons.

London, March 12.—A remarkable story of a blood feud which grew out of the bite of a dog and which was waged bitterly for 150 years has just come out in Egypt. Two whole villages became involved in this feud, and there has just ended in Cairo a trial of seventy-five persons accused of murders growing out of it. Twenty-one of the accused persons were sentenced to ten years' penal servitude. The story is told in a special dispatch to the Daily Mail from its correspondent in Cairo. It says: "An assize case has just ended which is one of the most remarkable held in Egypt for years. It originated in a vendetta, not between families—a common thing in the life of Egypt—but between two whole villages, Hamidat and Ashraf, near Kenh, Upper Egypt, north-east of the ruins of Thebes."

"One hundred and fifty years ago a dog in the village of Hamidat bit a dog in the village of Ashraf and he died. A quarrel followed between his relatives and the owner of the Hamidat dog, which developed until all the inhabitants of Ashraf considered all persons of Hamidat blood guilty of his death. The hatred of one village for the other became hereditary and assassination was common between them whenever the conditions of the country favored disorder."

"The unsettled conditions of last spring, when there was an anti-British rising in the district, was a heaven-sent opportunity. Ashraf found a pretext and attacked Hamidat in force. A score of Hamidatians were killed, 120 houses were burned and all movable, such as cattle and harvests, were carried off."

"Hamidat remembered the dog and bit back, killing sixteen of the assailants. These murderers have just been tried, seventy-one accused being brought up and one lawyer briefed for every five of the accused by the defence. Twenty-one received a sentence of ten years' penal servitude and he died. A quarrel followed between his relatives and the owner of the Hamidat dog, which developed until all the inhabitants of Ashraf considered all persons of Hamidat blood guilty of his death.
