LA MARQUISE de FONTENOY King George May Not Revive Old Peerages Now in Abeyance—German Family Tracing Back to Noah—The Story of a Talisman

Although the committee of privileges of the House of Lords has decided in favor of several claimants to peerages during the last twelve months, yet thus far King George V. has refrained from following its recommendations by calling the dignities in question out of abeyance.

King George, it is asserted on excellent authority, has resolved to revert to this rule, which will prove a source of satisfaction to the vast majority of Great Britain's hereditary legislators; for when the sovereign calls a peerage out of abeyance in favor of any claimant, the peerage becomes invested with precedence determined by the date of the original creation of the dignity, and takes the "peer" of the peer of his grade, whose honors are less ancient.

Thus, when Queen Victoria, in 1839, on the recommendation of her premier, Lord Melbourne, terminated the 414 years' abeyance of the Barony of Camoy in favor of the present Lord Camoy, his great-grandson, she was married to Miss Irene Sherman, daughter of the late William Watts Sherman, of New York.

The Barony of Hastings had been dormant since 1839, when it was called out of abeyance by Queen Victoria in 1840, in favor of Sir Jacob Astley of Melton. A countess, however, who took the name of all barons whose peerages dated from reigns subsequent to that of Edward I. in 1229.

The Barony of Beaumont had been in abeyance for about 520 years, that of Braye for over 200 years, and that of Vaux for 175 years when revived by Queen Victoria; all during the first decade following the accession of the present king.

It is one which does not find favor in the eyes of George V., and it looks very much as if Money-Louise, of Count's Bank in London, would have to do without the ancient Barony of Latimer, and Colonel Alexander Leith would have to give up the title of the baron, Baron of Burch, despite the recent recommendations of the committee of privileges of the House of Lords in favor of their claimant, the Duke of Devonshire.

The latter term must be confounding, if not misleading. There are plenty of dormant peerages, such as for instance the Earldom of Middlesex and the Barony of Gardiner, by reason of the fact that no lawful claim to the succession has been advanced, or in the case of the latter, because of the death of the holder.

Of all the reigning houses of Germany, there is not one that puts forward greater pretensions to antiquity than the Duchy of Anhalt, the members of which say they are able to prove their ancestry from a male line back to Noah, their patronymic of Ascania being derived from the castle of Ascania, or of Aschiria, now in ruins, but which figures in still existing contemporary records as a powerful stronghold in A. D. 1039. The members of the family are bound up with a talisman, or rather with the gift of a toad. The talisman, an amulet, is a small, round, glass globe, like the "Lack of Eden Hall," of the ancient family of Musgrave, or the Countess peer, of the great Scotch house of Hay, and the Lee peer of the Loekhart, is an ancient ring, with an extraordinary history.

The ring is still in existence. It is made of gold of a pale color, and adorned with three diamonds. The stones are very old and not well polished. The two outside ones triangular, and the central one oblong. The ring is kept in a small box, carefully hidden away in the immensely thick walls of the old palace, and it is only the reigning duke who has the key to the safe, or who knows of its exact location. Moreover, the warning of the Lady Toad, or, as she is known in German, of the Frau Kröte, is so strictly heeded, that all fires in the palace are extinguished early on Christmas Eve, no matter how freezing the weather, while the grand master of the household, the officer of the guard, and several other officials patrol the building from cellar to garret until daybreak on Christmas morning.

After this it is hardly necessary to add that throughout the length and breadth of the duchy, toads are treated with marked consideration and kindness by the aristocracy, and are perfectly safe from that cruelty which so unjustly falls to the share of these useful but homely reptiles in other countries of the old world and the new.
