SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson X.—Third Quarter, For Sept. 3, 1911.

THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, a Comprehensive Quarterly Review—Golden Text, Pa. xxxiv, 14—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

LESSON I.—Isaiah's prophecy concerning Sennacherib (Isa. xxxvii, 14-38). Golden Text, Ps. xlv, 1, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." Sennacherib is in the line of Cain and Pharaoh and all enemies of God and His people to be consummated in the blaspheming anti-christ of the last days, back of whom the trumpet of doom is always seen the devil. The devotion of Ezekiel to the living and true God was too much for the great adversary, and he was stirred up the king of Assyria against Ezekiel. But see how two men who knew God prevailed in prayer.

LESSON II.—The suffering servant of Jehovah (Isa. lii, 8, to liii, 12). Golden Text, Isa. liii, 6, "The Lord hath laid on Him the iniquity of us all." We find this record right in the midst of the last part of Isaiah, the middle chapter of the middle section, and the middle verse in liii, 6, which gives us the heart of all Scripture. "It with His stripes we have been healed, then as His redeemed ones standing against the world, the flesh and the devil, we must be content to suffer with Him and count it a great privilege (Phil. i, 29; I Pet. iv, 13; v, 1, 10). We shall be satisfied when He (liii, 11).

LESSON III.—Manasseh's wickedness and penitence (II Chron. xxxiii, 1-20). Golden Text, Isa. i, 16, 17, "Cease to do evil, learn to do well." Of all the wicked kings of the ten tribes none exceeded Ahab in wickedness, but Manasseh in Judah seems to have exceeded him. By comparing II Kings xxi with our lesson chapter we see how fearful the record is. It looks as if he did the very worst that he could do. The conversion of such a wicked man should greatly encourage parents who have ungodly children, for God is full of mercy.

LESSON IV.—Joshua's devotion to God (II Chron. iii, 4, 1-13). Golden Text, Eccles. xii, 1, "Remember now thy Creator in the days of thy youth." This boy king probably knew only of his father's zeal for God, and may have been thus inspired with a similar zeal. When he was only sixteen he began to seek God earnestly, and when he was twenty he purged the land from idolatry and did that which the man of God said 400 years before that he would do (I Kings xii, 2; II Kings xiii, 16). When he was twenty-six he began to repair the house of the Lord his God.

LESSON V.—The finding of the book of the law (I Chron. xxi, 14-30). Golden Text, Ps. cxix, 11, "Thy word have I hid in my heart, that I might not sin against Thee." As he went on in his good work, God gave him more light by causing the book of the law to be found. This was a fulfillment of the word, "Then shall we know if we follow on to know the Lord" (Hos. vi, 3). If we act up to the light we have, God will in some way send us more. The Lord knew that Joshua would inquire into this and be obedient and humble himself before God.

LESSON VI.—Jeremiah tried and acquitted (Jer. xxi, 1-19). Golden Text, Ps. xlv, 1, "The Lord is my right and my salvation, whom shall I fear?" It seems strange that priests and prophets of the Lord should want to kill a man because he spoke the words of the Lord, simply because he spoke the word and not sell them out there were in those days, and there are today, professional messengers of the Lord whom we never sent, prophets of the devil of their own heart speaking lies in His name (Jer. xiii, 14, 16, 21, 25, 26).

LESSON VII.—Jeremiah burns the prophet's book (Jer. xxxi, 29-32). Golden Text, Isa. xl, 8, "The word of our God shall stand forever." It was not the prophet's book, but the Lord's book, which the king cut up and buried in the fire, but the book was written again immediately in a larger edition, and the Lord attended to Jehoiakim. There are many now who seem to have no fear of God while professing to be His messengers and who ruthlessly set aside large portions of Scripture, calling them myths and fables. The Lord will see to them, and Ps. cxix, 89, stands.

LESSON VIII.—Jeremiah cast into prison (Jer. xxxvii, 4-21). Golden Text, Matt. v, 11, "Blessed are ye when men shall revile you and persecute you and shall say all manner of evil against you falsely for My sake." He is still hated and persecuted for the truth's sake, even as many were before Him, and are now and will be in the kingdom come (John xv, 18-21; xvi, 1-3). The father of lies cannot stand the truth and will not if he can help it, but he cannot say a finger on any child of God without permission and then only as far as permitted.

LESSON IX.—Judah carried captive to Babylon (Jer. xxxix, 1-10). Golden Text, Num. xxxii, 23, "Be sure your sin will find you out." Somewhat strange all the peaceful words of the false prophets, the word of the Lord by Jeremiah was literally fulfilled in due time. This age of so-called progress, which is the progress of all things, to be controlled by one devil possessed (and the anti-christ), will end by the overthrow of all things that can be seen, and then shall come the kingdom of peace and righteousness.

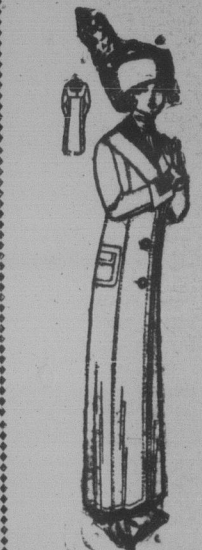
