BUCK HANGS

The End of the Murderer of Policeman Steadman.

He Dies Game—"Let her go" Being His Last Words.

The last scene in the tragedy, in which the first scene was enacted in Moncton policeman took place on Thursday of this week at Dorchester jail where "Buck" alais Robert Olsen, was hanged for the since been interred in the Catholic cemetery at that place. The crime being still fresh in the minds of the people there is no need of repeating the story. The murderer and his pal "Jim" were tramps and got the credit of committing many robberies in this province. Both men were desperate, and always ready to use the revolvers they carried, if they thought they were likely to get cornered, as was the case in Moncton, when "Buck' and "Jim" making a dash for liberty from a house railed by the police, "Buck" shot and killed the officer who attempted to capture him. He was tried for wilful rder, and paid the penalty of his crime on Thursday morning at 10 o'clock, "Jim" his pal, being sentenced to 25 years in

The official executioner from Toronto arrived at Dorchester on Wednesday, and made all preparations for the final act. A very touching letter was written to "Buck'

DORCHESTER PENITENTIARY, November 30. DEAR FRIEND,—I am sincerely sorry you must die, old friend. It is some onsolation to know that you have devoted the last days of life in preparing your mind to meet God. No one could sympathize more sincerely with you than I have. I would have done anything in my power to save your life, but I am as powerless to aid you as you are to help yourself. We both owe a debt of gratitude to your spiritual adviser for his Saviour who died for us all. A few years and we must all appear before our Maker to answer for all deeds. I wish I could shake your hands once more, but if I never do it will be a source of satisfaction the rest of my life to know you died like a good Christian. Once more I sincerely urge you to seek God's forgiveness. Goodbye, old friend; may we both one day

The scaffold was pronounced by the hangman, Radeliffe, to work like a charm, Radeliffe states that he has hanged thirty-six persons in his lifetime. He used a Russian hemp rope on Thursday that did duty on several other occasiona. Mrs. Atkinson visited Buck Wednesday night and again Thursday morning in company with Miss McDougall. The condemned man ate a hearty breakfast and seemed to thoroughly enjoy the meal. His spiritual adviser was with him all the morning.
