Two of the bodies found yesterday by the representatives of the police department were identified as Eugene Caress, 33, linotype operator.

Howard's body was identified by his son, who has remained almost con-stantly on watch since the catastrophe. "While it is well enough be generally known that Los Angele prepared to spend any amount of noney in good faith, I don't much care for this putting of prices on heads. Every county constable, every deputy sheriff, every private detective, so-called, in the United States, will be 'solving' this mystery. We will be chasing all over the country investigating these alleged discoveries.

"It is all very well to offer rewards for the capture of known criminals. But I hope that this giving of rewards can be stopped. Suppose four men say to each other: 'Here is an immense sum which we can get—a fortune for each of us,' and for which they begin to frame up evidence against unfortunate but innocent men. This thing has been done often. Every man who deals with criminals knows that many nnocent men have been convicted on perjured testimony bought by a great
