BRITISH COLUMBIA.—A correspondent writing from British Columbia expresses the opinion that the people are coming into the Province too fast, as a greater proportion of those who come are single men and do not intend to take up land.

PLUCK REWARDED.—A purse made up by the Montreal Mount Royals, and containing \$100, was presented by Col. Labrecque to private F. Fitzpatrick, "as a reward for the plucky manner in which he stuck to his rifle in the difficulty between him and the deceased rowdy McKewen, at Montreal.

RIOTS AND BARK STOCK.—A correspondent of the Montreal Star signing himself a "Bank stock-holder" says the recent failure of the authorities to preserve order in Montreal was no doubt one of the instances which caused a decline in Bank Stocks there and says the reputation of the limits of his operation if once he goes to war.

THE UNITED STATES OFFICIALS AND POLITICS.—It has been officially determined in the United States that all political organizations, for the future, have no connection with political organizations, of a large percentage of U. S. officials.

ARROCKPORT VALLEY RAILROAD.—The Mayor Commission says that all officials named in the Arrockport Valley Railroad and through the devious windings of the settlement of the details, the law was not complied with, though the parties were innocent. The court has recently decided in effect, that the road is not located at all, and the proceedings thus far void.

DISCRETION OF A LABOR LEAGUE.—The Central Council of the Labor League of the United States, held a meeting in Washington on the 19th, at which after passing resolutions in reference to the depressed state of labor and its anticipated evil results, it enjoined upon its members moral agitation, and deprecated violence and riot.

JUDGE HILTON AND THE JEW.—A despatch from Chicago states that Judge Hilton has stated decidedly, that he intends to make no change with regard to the reception of the Hebrews at the Grand Union Hotel, Saratoga, "the injunction" of the Judge is said to have been a splendid advertisement, and the Grand Union is more fashionable than ever. All this, however, does not cover up the fact that Judge Hilton did a very foolish thing in attempting to prohibit Jews.

THE SHIP WELLINGTON.—On the 18th ult., a survey was made on the ship Wellington, by the Portwardens of Halifax. This vessel, as already stated, is Miramichi on the 3rd inst. bound for Europe, and after collision with a Nova Scotia vessel called the Capri put into Halifax considerably damaged. A portion of the cargo will have to be discharged before the full extent of the damage done by the collision with the barque Capri can be ascertained. She will have to have a new foremast, jibboom, etc.

A STRANGE DESCRIPTION OF ST. JOHN. LeBlas Public of Paris has the following geographical and statistical allusion to St. John and its recent calamity— "The city of St. John, which is the scene of this mighty catastrophe, is situated on the Lakes Naupagus and Ponchartraine. The Mississippi River flows through it. It has a superficies of 200 square miles, with a population of 7,517 souls, of which 2,777 are free and 4,740 slaves. The soil of St. John is very fertile, producing principally sugar and corn.

THE LATE BRITISH TEMPLARS.—The Fourteenth Annual Session of the Grand Lodge of British Templars assembled in Howard Lodge Room, Halifax, on Tuesday 10th ult. A. S. Lent, Esq., of Yarmouth, W. G. C. T. occupied the chair. Nearly all the G. L. officers and a large number of representatives were present. On Wednesday morning a resolution, of which notice had been given, affirming the acceptance of the basis of Union by this Grand Lodge, after a lengthy but friendly discussion was carried unanimously. The Grand Chief Templar then declared the Grand Lodge to be a Provincial Lodge of the United Temperance Association, the members joining heartily in singing "Praise God from whom all blessing flow, &c." The election of office bearers for the ensuing year then took place.

General News. MASONRY OF THE DOMINION.—The Masonic body in the Dominion is said to number thirty thousand members. A CONVENTION OF GOVERNORS of each state in the United States, is to be held at Greenbair, White Sulphur Springs, some time in August.

TEMPERS OF THE NORTH WEST.—The number of Sioux who have emigrated from the United States to the North West is estimated at 4,200 souls, including 1,800 warriors.

MAYOR BEAUDRY OF MONTREAL.—The Orange lodges throughout Ontario have passed resolutions condemning Mayor Beaudry for not protecting the Montreal Orangemen.

THE RELEASE OF THE FENIANS REMOVED.—On Friday last a motion, in the House of Commons, for the release of the Fenian prisoners made by O'Connor Power, was rejected by a vote of 235 to 77.

CROPS IN P. E. ISLAND.—From various parts of P. E. Island reports are received that the dryness of the season has resulted unfavorably to the potato crop, and in some cases the farmers have had to fresh seed.

CONVENTION OF THE Y. M. C. A.—The Eleventh Annual Convention of the Young Men's Christian Association of the Maritime Provinces will be held in this town on Thursday, Sept. 6th and the three following days.

EARTHQUAKE AT RIVER DU LOUP.—A telegraphic despatch dated the 18th reports that a sharp shock of an earthquake, was felt at River du Loup the day previous, a very small earthquake sent to the locality.

A FENIAN ENGINE DRIVER.—On the 12th as an excursion train was conveying a number of Orangemen between Collingwood and Barrie, Ontario, the Orangemen hoisted the Union Jack, but the engineer, who is an enthusiastic Fenian, took it down and hoisted the green flag in its place.

THE MORMONS AND MEXICO.—The Mormons seem to think they have been rather persecuted of late and evince a disposition to move from the United States and go and live with the Mexicans. The first Mormon colony has already reached Hermosillo, the principal city of Sonora, on its way to some defined point beyond. There is now a chain of Mormon settlements extending from Utah through Arizona into Mexico, and it is highly probable that the Mormon emigration to Mexico will be large. It is not likely that the Mexicans will object to the religion of the Mormons or to their social customs, which are as different to the United States Government.

SOFT MILK JEWELRY.—The latest triumph of Yankee ingenuity is sour milk jewelry, made by Kingman & Hoag of Mansfield, Mass. The milk comes in shape of curd from the butter and chesapeake counties in New York, and looks, upon its arrival, a good deal like popped corn, but before it leaves their shop it undergoes a wonderful change, and receives the name of American coral. The secret in making it up is carefully guarded, but it is certain that it has to be heated very hot, during which coloring matter is introduced, followed by a very heavy pressure. Some of it is colored black and called jet, while some appears as glass, and is made into all kinds and styles known to the trade.

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
