

KINGS COUNTY LIBERALS NAME NO CANDIDATE.

Responsibility Is Handed Over to a Joint Committee From Kings and Albert.

The Liberal Convention Was Attended by a Crowd numbering 60—Address of Congratulation to Senator Domville Who Like Many Other Leading Liberals Was Not Present.

The liberal convention held at Hampton Saturday afternoon accomplished nothing further than the appointment of a small committee to confer with a similar committee from the liberal party in Albert, as to a joint convention and the adoption of an address to Senator Domville, the president of the Liberal Association of the county.

There were about 60 electors in the court room when the secretary, F. L. Fairweather, called the meeting to order. Senator Domville was not in attendance, and quite a large number of prominent liberals were conspicuous by their absence.

Mr. Fairweather was very brief in his remarks. He said the president was unable to be present, it would therefore be necessary to elect a committee from among their number to preside over the meeting.

The following address was handed to the chairman and secretary, and was read: To the Honorable James Domville, Member of the Senate of the Dominion of Canada.

The liberals of the county of Kings, duly assembled in convention this day, wish to extend their hearty congratulations upon your appointment to the senate of Canada.

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CHAMBERLAIN RESIGNS?

A Wild Field Day in the British House of Commons.

The Master of the Situation did not Receive a Word of Approval from Either Side of the House—But He Never Lost His Head.

LONDON, June 9.—The rumored resignation of Colonial Secretary Chamberlain is the most startling development of the proposal of the chancellor of the exchequer, Mr. Ritchie, to abolish the corn duty, the debate on which kept the house of commons day packed and spellbound until midnight.

One of the members of the government who contributed to today's debate vigorously declared themselves as free traders and frankly opposed Mr. Chamberlain's proposals. Except for Mr. Chaplin, not a voice on either side of the house was raised in effective support of the chancellor's proposal.

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METHODISTS MEET.

Annual Synod of the St. John District at Hampton.

HAMPTON, June 10.—The chairman, Rev. Dr. Sprague, having been detained in St. John to attend a very important gathering, the meeting was called to order by Rev. Thos. J. Delaney, who presided over the session.

It was freely predicted this afternoon that the government will resign the office of premier, and that a royal commission will be appointed to inquire into the circumstances of the resignation.

LONDON, June 10.—Perplexity is the keynote of this morning's editorial in the "Morning Post," which is a very interesting and valuable contribution to the discussion of the political situation.

The latest gossip in best informed quarters is to the effect that Mr. Chamberlain will not resign today, and that he will endeavor to dispose of the Irish land bill and stave off a crisis until the end of the month.

It is generally agreed that Sir Michael Hicks-Beach's speech was a long conference with Mr. Balfour in the house of commons, and that the result was a compromise between the two sides.

The Daily Chronicle (liberal), referring to Mr. Chamberlain's statement to the secretary of the Birmingham Liberal Unionist Association, points out that Canada gives a bounty on steel and iron, and asks whether Mr. Chamberlain would put a countervailing duty on bounty-fed Canadian iron.
